# From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson

As you read this, we are in the middle of the Yamim Noraim, the days of awe. During this 10-day period of re-visioning and restructuring our spiritual lives, if we are true to our Jewish identities and selves, we will come out on the other side as spiritually recharged beings.

The big question becomes, "what do we do with that strengthening of our being?" What are our goals besides surviving the Yom Kippur fast this year? Is there a list of attributes we would choose to emulate, whether it be of other people or a vision of being more like God? Remember - we are looking to be more LIKE God and not more God-like. In order to be more like God, we need a list of those behaviors that will allow us to come clos-



er to our goal. That after all, is what the season is all about. Creating a vision and drawing a roadmap to get there.

Rabbi David Wolpe of Los Angeles writes "Today the Jewish mission is not diminished. In a world that still cries out for healing, where suffering and narrowness are endemic, to be chosen means to have a special calling to teach that ALL human beings are children of God created in Gods image and MUST be treated as sacred".

Many see the Jews as "the chosen people". But, let us be clear: Chosenness is not a right to boastfulness, it is a holy task, a responsibility, sacred and to be undertaken with the sanctity that a God given obligation requires.

This year open your notebooks. God is speaking to a world unclear of its direction, unclear of purpose.

As we approach the High <u>Holy</u> Days, not just High <u>Holidays</u>, let us rededicate ourselves to a higher purpose.

Let us pray that, with God's guidance, "we may find our way to the straight paths for your names sake" and that our goals will be met as we reach further ahead and deeper into our souls with the word of God on our lips and in our hearts.

May your prayers be true, your heart full and the word of the Lord on your lips. May you have an easy fast and may God bless your journey.



# Who Was Haym Solomon?

Read this fascinating history of the \$1 bill all the way to the bottom to know about <u>Haym Solomon</u>. You may be in for quite a surprise!



On the back of the One Dollar bill, you will see two circles. Together, they comprise the Great Seal of the United States. The First Continental Congress requested that Benjamin Franklin and a group of men come up with a Seal. It took them four years to accomplish this task and another two years to get it approved.

If you look at the left-hand circle, you will see a Pyramid.

Notice the face is lighted, and the western side is dark. This country was just beginning. We had not begun to explore the west or decided what we could do for Western Civilization. The Pyramid is uncapped, again signifying that we were not even close to being finished. Inside the Capstone you have the all-seeing eye, an ancient symbol for divinity. It was Franklin 's belief that one man couldn't do it alone, but a group of men, with the help of God, could do anything. 'IN GOD WE TRUST' is on this currency.

The Latin above the pyramid, ANNUIT COEPTIS, means, 'God has favored our undertaking.' The Latin below the pyramid, NOVUS ORDO SECLORUM, means, 'a new order has begun.' At the base of the pyramid is the Roman numeral for 1776. (MDCCLXXVI)

If you look at the right-hand circle, and check it carefully, you will learn that it is on every National Cemetery in the United States. It is also on the Parade of Flags Walkway at the Bushnell, Florida National Cemetery, and is the centerpiece of most heroes' monuments.

Slightly modified, it is the seal of the President of the United States, and it is always visible whenever he speaks, yet very few people know what the symbols mean.

The Bald Eagle was selected as a symbol for victory for two reasons:

First, he is not afraid of a storm; he is strong, and he is smart enough to soar above it. Secondly, he wears no material crown. We had just broken from the King of England.

Also, notice the shield is unsupported. This country can now stand on its own.

Few people know it was Solomon who saved the Army through his financial <u>contributions</u>...then died a pauper. Haym Solomon gave \$25 million to save the Continental Army, money that was sorely needed to help realize America 's – our freedom and independence from England. Therein lies America 's Judeo-Christian beginning.

Most Americans do NOT know any of this. They are not taught because their history teachers do NOT know this.

At the top of that shield there is a white bar signifying congress, a unifying factor. We were coming together as one nation. In the Eagle's beak you will read, 'E PLURIBUS UNUM' meaning, 'from many - one.' Above the Eagle, we have the thirteen stars, representing the thirteen original colonies, and any clouds of misunderstanding rolling away, Again, we were coming together as one.

Notice what the Eagle holds in his talons. He holds an olive branch and arrows. This country wants peace, but we will never be afraid to fight to preserve peace. The Eagle always wants to face the olive branch, but in time of war, his gaze turns toward the arrows.

An (untrue) old-fashioned belief says that the number 13 is an unlucky number. This is almost a worldwide belief. You will almost never see a room numbered 13, or any hotels or motels with a 13th floor. But think about this:

America, which relies on God (not a number) to direct and lead, boldly chose:

13	original colonies,	13	stars above the eagle,
13	signers of the Declaration of Independence,	13	bars on that shield,
13	stripes on our flag,	13	leaves on the olive branch,
13	steps on the pyramid,	13	fruits, and, if you look closely,
13	letters in 'Annuit Coeptis',	13	arrows.

And finally, notice the arrangement of the 13 stars in the right-hand circle.

You will see that they are arranged as a Star of David. This was ordered by George Washington who, when he asked Haym Solomon, a wealthy Philadelphia Jew, what he would like as a personal reward for his services to the Continental Army. Solomon said he wanted nothing for himself, but he would like something for his people. The Star of David was the result.






December 8, 2019 Temple Beth Shalom Vero Beach

# Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow



A number of years ago, I reviewed a book titled <u>The Jewish Book of Why</u>, by Alfred Kolatch, who has written numerous books. Fortunately, we now have <u>The Second Jewish book of Why</u> - both boxed together on our shelves. There are numerous topics that are discussed - about things with which we are familiar but want to know more about. Somehow, we don't always have detailed explanations about them. We want to know why certain things are done and what they mean.

Here in this review, my goal is not to give you answers, but to interest you in finding out more about the "whys". I'll separate the books into two reviews - one today for Book One and next month for Book Two.

The books are divided into topics, and each topic (chapter) has an introduction. The author tries to give you explanations from observant to liberal, in order to explain the reasoning behind the practices that are followed. I urge you to read the general Introduction to get a background on the how, when, and where the mass of Jewish laws and customs developed. They refer to all aspects of life. In Book One, we find topics such as: The Early Years of Life, Marriage and Divorce, Death and Mourning, Dietary Laws, Objects and Garb, the Synagogue, Prayer, the Sabbath, Passover, Shavuot, the High Holidays, Minor Observances, and General Questions.

Here are some examples of the questions in Book One:

Why is a girl named in the synagogue whereas a male child is named at the brit?

Why are weddings prohibited between Passover and Shavuot?

Why is the wedding ceremony held under a *chuppah*?

Why is a *tallit* sometimes used as a *chuppah*?

Why is the ring placed upon the forefinger of the bride's right hand?

Why does the groom break a glass at the end of the marriage ceremony?

Why is a light bulb instead of a glass often broken at the wedding ceremony?

Why is cremation prohibited according to Jewish law?

Why does the Meal of Consolation (Se'udat Havrah) generally include rolls, bagels, and hard-boiled eggs?

Why is a memorial candle lighted in a house of mourning?

Why is the language of the Kaddish Aramaic rather than Hebrew?

Why is hunting discouraged in Jewish tradition?

Why is the *Tallit* not worn in the evening?

Why is the color blue popular as the color for embroidery on a *Tallit*?

Why is a quill used for writing religious documents?

Why are varmulkes worn? (the book gives more than several reasons)

Why is the Torah raised high after it is read?

Why are the Sabbath candles kindled before the candle lighting blessing has been recited?

Why do women, after they have kindled the Sabbath candles, cover their eyes while pronouncing the benediction?

Why is the word *Challah* used to describe the Sabbath bread?

Why are 2 *Challot* placed on the Sabbath table?

Why are the Sabbath *Challot* covered with a decorative cloth?

Why do Jews eat *gefilte fish* on the Sabbath (and holidays)?

Why are perforations made in *matzot*?

Why have so many versions of the Haggadah been published?

Why is the fourth of the Four Questions in the Haggadah different today from what it was originally?

Why does the first day of Rosh Hashana never fall on a Wednesday, Friday, or Sunday?

Why have 3 different sound patterns been established for the blowing of the Shofar?

Why is carrot *tzimmes* served on Rosh Hashana?

Why is *Yizkor* included in the Yom Kippur service?

Why do many people think Mordecai was Esther's uncle?

Why is the name of God not mentioned in the entire Book of Esther?

Why according to the Jewish calendar does the day begin at sundown?

Why are some of the Jewish holidays celebrated for more days in the Diaspora than in Israel?

Why is there a chief rabbi in England and other countries, but not in the U.S.?

Remember, there are so many more questions in this first volume!

Next month's review will cover the second volume in which you will be able to read some of the questions it has concerning other topics. 


