From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson

Well, we've made it through 2020.

It's been a difficult year, by any definition.

So many things to reflect on as the year draws to a close and we celebrate the miracle of Chanukah again. The miracle of lights allows us to focus on light and how it creates a road to understanding. The metaphor of light to understanding (and darkness to a lack of it) is born out again and again.



In the last week, I have seen a movie wherein the "werewolf" character and the Frankenstein monster both exhibit enormous human kindness and empathy and the humans are the creatures without any such traits.

Ridiculous you think? As I am writing this, I am watching a TV story about a scientist (a 2020 Nobel Prize winner) explain a newly defined gene titled CRISPR....


CRISPR can adjust your DNA strand to eliminate diseases from the earth. The example the developer used was Sickle cell anemia, a disease that strikes the African American community. So, my head started to wonder: Could it also then solve the riddle of Taysachs, the disease that hits Eastern European Jews in massive numbers almost to the exclusion of other cultures?

How wonderful that would be! Just as I was starting to kvell in the sense that a cure could be close, I heard the moderator ask: "Well, but if you can restructure the human DNA strand, could you "design" children inter-utero to "build" humans as you want them to be? A designer-superior race? As the scientist said, "Well - yes, BUT we have committees to make sure that isn't how it's used", my nerves immediately fried.

Is humanity now at the precipice of science expanding our ability far beyond what our ethical/moral boundaries are prepared for? Have we reached my grandmother's proverbial," Too smart for your own good" moment?

This month's Torah portions present us with similar challenges. Jacob has a dream of a ladder going up to the sky and "angels" are going up and down never stopping. Some suggest Jacob is trying to imagine the proximity between God and Humanity. The humans never get close enough to their destination, do they? Certainly, my favorite quote fits here:

> The obsession's in the chasing, Not the apprehending, The pursuit you seek, but never the arrest.



With the beginning of a world that includes CRISPR technology to adapt humans for good (imagine a world where we can "tinker" with DNA and eliminate Down syndrome... or a world where someone can define and actually create a more perfect race).....

As a Jew, having heard that before, I am now challenged to wonder what part each of us plays in creating a more ethical world. What are our responsibilities to that world and each other and how do we achieve that lofty goal?

It is our duty to each other to try.

As we light the Chanukah lights this year, perhaps the gifts we can share are not necessarily unwrappable ones, but creatable ones. Imagine a world where each night of Chanukah, each one of us commits to, or performs, 1 mitzvah for each candle...

OK - that would be 8 for each of us. 2 people in a household? 16 through the holiday. 150? 1,200!! If we take each of the 150 adults (ok, add the kids too) and they perform 1 mitzvah a day-1-ONE-echad- think how we can change this world from darkness to light...

Then we will have truly celebrated the Festival of lights and created a world wherein we might not need to be in a world where Frankenstein and the Werewolf bring more humanity to the world than humans....

After all, isn't that what humanity created as a result of tinkering too much?

Weather permitting Friday December 11th at 7:00 pm we are going to try to see if outdoor services can work for us. Here's the arrangement:

- 1.) Check the weather station first!
- 2.) If all is good, drive to the temple.

There will be 2 options:

- a.) <u>Very</u> limited parking in the parking lot (about 10-12 cars).
- b.) Everyone else, bring a beach chair to sit on.
- 3.) If you're in a car, you will be given, when you get situated, a radio station on AM radio to turn to, as the transmitter will transmit whatever we do through the radio to your car.
- 4.) If you're on a beach chair, we will have a sound system running sound for you.
- 5.) We will light the Chanukiah on the Temple wall at 7:10 pm and then prepare to show the service on a 20 foot screen we have acquired.

6.) **PLEASE BE AWARE**:

There will be no service indoors.

If inclement weather ensues, this Shabbat event will not happen.


Please understand we, the members of TBEI, are, in fact, one of the most at risk age groups and the Board, along with your officers and me, are determined to do everything we can to protect each of us.



Please Note:

- For the duration of this pandemic and <u>when</u> we re-open, we are limiting our capacity to 40 per service and it is our intention to alternate services, i.e.: Friday night one week and Saturday morning the following week unless otherwise instructed. If you call after we have filled our limit, you will be put on the list for the following Friday or Saturday.
- Let's hope this is going to be a very short-lived and temporary solution and we will be back to normal quickly.
- The following protocols have been put in place for the benefit or our entire membership and any guests that might attend our services during this pandemic:
- You must call the Temple office to make a reservation no later than the Thursday morning prior to the Friday evening or Saturday morning service you would like to attend. Your name(s) will then be placed on a reservation list and you will be assigned seat number(s) according to the number of people for whom you are making a reservation. There is a limit of 40.
- If individuals (non-members) show up without a reservation, we can accommodate them up to our limit; if we have no-shows from the reservation list or if we haven't gotten 40 reservations, and they will be given our guidelines for service attendance.
- Sisterhood and Brotherhood members will be at the door for all services to welcome and direct service attendees to their seat(s).
- We will follow the CDC protocols for services; temperature will be taken at the door, masks <u>must</u> be worn and in place, hand sanitizer will be used upon entry.
- Social distancing will be strictly adhered to. Chairs will be designated and numbered as the only chairs that can be sat in.
- If a mask is removed or not properly in place, we reserve the right to tell the congregant that they need to fix their mask or cannot stay in the temple and must leave. This includes both adults and children.
- Anyone that calls and says they have a medical reason for not wearing a mask will be told to watch the service at home on YouTube.
- There will be no Oneg or Kiddush after any service until further notice.

Occupancy is limited to the sanctuary and rest rooms; the kitchen and social hall are off limits.


If you are seated where you can't see the screens and it is necessary to use books, Rabbi will announce page numbers. Books will be available on a table at the rear of the sanctuary. Books must be returned to the table at the rear of the sanctuary for sanitization and decontamination purposes.

You must vacate the building without socializing when the service ends.

CHANUKAH.....

The kindling of the Menorah is the focal point of the Chanukah holiday, symbolizing religious freedom and the strength of the Jewish spirit. The menorah is kindled on each of the eight nights of Chanukah. This year Chanukah begins on Thursday night, December 10th. The candles are lit right after sunset and usually stay lit for at least a half hour after sunset. The Chanukah candles are lit before the Shabbat candles and after the Havdalah candle at the end of Shabbat. The candles are lit from left to right.

The book is called <u>The Greatest Jewish Sto-</u> ries Ever Told, selected, retold, and introduced by David Patterson, a person who majored in philosophy as an undergraduate, and went on to major in comparative literature

for his Master's and PhD. He was converted to Judaism in 1990 and has lectured at universities and organizations around the world, has remained active in Holocaust and Genocide Studies, and participated in other Holocaust groups. He has published over 80 articles in a variety of journals, and is the author of a number of books. It is his unique collection of stories and tales that we turn our attention.

As I look through the table of contents, I discover the major topics - Biblical Tales, Talmudic Tales, Midrashic Tales, Kabbalistic Tales, Legends and Folktales, Tales of the Hasidism, and Modern Tales. Each group of tales has an introductory overview by the author at the beginning of the chapter, familiarizing us with the time period from which the stories originate, and in addition, some of the individual tales have a few more sentences of explanation. Both are worth reading.

The major Introduction at the beginning of this book discusses "what makes a Jewish story Jewish" and "what makes a Jewish story great?" It goes on: "A Jewish story is much more than a story told by a Jew or a story told about other Jews. A Jewish story is about God's relation to the Jewish people, their relation to God, and what these two relationships have to do with the way people relate to one another. It is about handing down a teaching and assuming responsibility. Therefore it is about a tradition that conveys what Jews hold dear, what Jews live for, and what Jews have to answer for." Do not forget that as you read the tales in this book.

The first section contains Biblical Tales - tales from the Torah, the Prophets and the Writings. Also included are two tales from the Apocrypha. Because I know many of you are familiar with a lot of these biblical stories, I'll be brief, but will remind you that you should read the short introductions to those tales you might like to read, helping you to gain more insight into each one's meaning and purpose. Included in these stories are "The Wisest of Men" (I Kings 3; 4-28), which helps you to think about what a man might ask for, and "Jacob Wrestles With God" (Genesis 32;4-32), where we can think about what it means to be called "Israel". There are 28 stories in this chapter.

The Talmudic Tales are next, and number 32 in all. Here we find stories such as "Slow to Anger" (SHABBAT; 30B-31A) in which Rabbi Hillel not only practices patience and is slow to anger, but also teaches us a lesson. Another tale, "The Renegades of Babylon" (BETZA 32B), where "what it means to be a Jew" is shown in the qualities Jews possess. "The Old Man and the Carob Tree" (TA'ANI 23A) shows that "Gratitude and Responsibility are two of the most important links between God and humanity: gratitude for the labor of those who have lived before us and thanks to whom we have life, and responsibility for those who are yet unborn and whose lives are entrusted to our care." Lastly, we have the tale " The Angels Rebuked" (SANHEDRIN 39B) which reminds us that <u>every</u> human being, whether a friend or enemy, Jew or Gentile is "a child of God and a descendant of Adam". Thus, "the death of any single human being diminishes the humanity of all-even the death of an enemy." Don't we show this during our Passover Seder when we dip our finger into the cup of wine, reminding us of the Egyptian first-born, mourning the loss of life? Shouldn't we constantly remind ourselves of the sanctity of life today?

Let's move on to the next section, Midrashic Tales - stories which explore the Torah even deeper. As the book states, Midrashic tales explore "the motivations of the characters and the implications of their actions as presented in the Bible and Talmud." Again, I urge you to first read the introduction to this section, as well as individual introductions before each tale. There are 18 tales in all. You may choose to read "Why Moses Was Not Buried in the Holy Land" (DEUTERONOMY RABBAH 2:8-9). This is an interesting tale in which Moses has a conversation with God, constantly about why he cannot enter the Promised Land. The answer has to do with passing oneself off as something we are not. "The Two Jewels" (MIDRASH ON PROVERBS 30:10) is an interesting tale about being tested, yet not losing our faith in God.

Next are the Kabbalistic Tales, 24 in all, all dating from the 12th to 13th centuries. Some tales come from a group of Kabbalists known as "the Iyyan Circle" from the south of France, but most are taken from the Zohar, written by Mosheh de Leon from Spain. These tales, as the introduction explains, "may be viewed as akin to the prayers that draw not only the mystics" closer to God, but others too. The book continues: "Relating and receiving these kabbalistic tales is a means of penetrating the secret side, the sacred side. of all the things, both and beyond us. Continued on next page

They open the connections between life and meaning, without which we have neither." This section includes a beautiful tale, "The Union of Heaven and Earth" (ZOHAR ON GENESIS 30B-31A). It is the joining of what is above and what is below. The union of heaven and earth in the end, finds their union in "the life of the human being who joins his life to the Holy One by affirming the holiness of other human beings." Another tale is "Why the Jews Sway When They Pray" (ZOHAR ON NUMBERS) 218B - 219A). Only the mystics can relate it to a flame! I really think many of you will appreciate and enjoy this section of Kabbalistic tales which take you to a deeper level than all other parts of the book.

Again, we move forward to the next section, "Legends And Folktales". These are usually created by people, not a specific person. Legends are about famous individuals such as a hero or sage - who help to develop tradition. Folktales deal with the common people, and are often similar to the culture of a certain region or historical period. They often introduce you to a teaching about what a certain culture values. In this section we come across "How the Second Becomes the First" - a delightful tale of around 1,000 years about the argument between Hebrew letters over which one should be first in the alphabet. The connection can be seen between the words and their meanings. There is also the tale of "From the Tears of Truth", a legend originating with Eastern European Jewry. What was involved in creating a human being? Experience the discussion between four angels - of Mercy, Truth, Peace, and Justice. Truely a meaningful legend! Lastly, I'll mention "Judge Everyone Favorably", a lesson on being slow to condemn which is based on Talmudic teachings. There are 28 folktales and legends in this chapter.

"Tales of the Hasidim" are in the next chapter, making up 37 tales in all. I remember over a long period of times hearing Hasidic tales used in the temples I have attended. In fact, tales play a very large role in Hasidism - more than in any other movement in Judaism. In more modern times, Martin Buber, Elie Wiesel, Isaac Bashevis Singer and Joshua Heschel have compiled a good number of Hasidic tales, or have written about great Hasidic personalities. One tale in this section is "Learning to Walk", concerning our fears about the silence of when we need God to listen. See how it is likened to a child learning how to walk. In the tale "God is Hiding", find out what the game "hide-and-seek has to do with our relationship with God.

The final section of the book is "Modern Tales", which includes 19 in all. These tales were written by people of many cultures and times (during the last three centuries). All are concerned with human values, "large scale migrations; new opportunities in social, political, and cultural spheres; new forms of religious observance; and, at times, new forms of oppression." Included in this section is "Soap and Water", by Anzia Yezierska, who immigrated to America with her parents in the beginning of the twentieth century. She tells her story of sweatshops, poverty and then college. One can see that even coming here, life could be very difficult. In "The Tale of a Nanny Goat, by S.Y. Agnon, you will find an emotional tale of the importance of communication, and about the wonder of the Land of Israel.

The stories in this book vary in length - most are about a page, some a couple of pages, and the longest tales are in the final section of "Modern Tales". Obviously, you can pick and choose which ones you want to read. Don't forget to leave time for mulling things over in your mind. When I first chose this book to review, I didn't realize I would like it as much as I did. Please make the effort to check it out. The reward is great!.




