From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson

This year spring has had a different effect on our lives than at almost any other time in our history. At the time we read the Holiness code in Leviticus, we were only limitedly able to interact with our friends, family and neighbors. THE STAMP CORNER by Ellis Bromberg

Beginning this month, the Shofar will share, from my worldwide postage stamp collection, an appropriate stamp to mark an upcoming Jewish holiday or event.

On May 16 at sunset, we will celebrate Shavuot, known as the Feast of Weeks because it marks seven weeks after the second Passover seder, corresponding to the seven weeks it took Moses and the Israelites to trek through the desert to reach Mount Sinai.

Although the holiday began as an ancient grain harvest festival, it has been identified since biblical times with the revelation of the Torah on Mount Sinai to the Jewish people.

The stamp featured here, issued by Israel in 1971, was designed in the form of an illuminated Hebrew manuscript, and bears the Hebrew phrase related to this aspect of Shavuot. The English translation is found in the tab at the bottom of the stamp: "...and God wrote upon the tables the words of the covenant" (Exodus 34:28).

Some of you may have noticed that I did not review a Passover cookbook in my April article. That's because I made a mistake. (Yes I do make mistakes)! I realized too late that Passover, this year, started in March, not April. So all of you "foodies" missed some Passover recipes in 2021. I really should have checked the calendar first and not assumed it took place in just April. So, I learned a lesson - don't take things for granted! Instead of getting upset with myself, I realized this was a wonderful opportunity to acquaint you with another holiday - the holiday of Shavuot

which has its own variety of culinary delights. On the calendar, its two days are May 17th and 18th - just enough time to look over some new delicious recipes for it.

The culinary concoctions for Shavuot involve dairy products. Why is that? There are various explanations given, depending upon where you look.

1. Dairy foods (and honey) should be eaten on the day the Torah was received on Mt. Sinai due to the words in the Song of Songs; "honey and milk under thy lip" (4:11) which imply that "milk products and honey, the words of the Torah are pleasant and good for our spirits."

2. The basis for the custom of eating dairy is also found in Exodus 23:19 - " The choicest first fruits" (refers to the harvest festival of Shavuot) "shalt thou bring to the House of the Lord. Thou shalt not seethe(cook) a kid in its mother's milk" - meaning there should be a meat dish first, followed later by a dairy one, during Shavuot.

3. A legend maintained that when the Israelites reached their homes after receiving the Torah at Mt. Sinai, they did not have enough time to slaughter an animal for a meat meal, but quickly prepared a dairy meal instead.

4. At this time of year (late May or early June), churning and cheese-making are common features of spring harvest festivals over much of the world. When goats, sheep, and cows begin to graze more, they produce more milk.

5. In Psalm 68:16-17, Mt. Sinai is called by six different names - One of them being *bar gavnunim* or 'mountain of peaks". *gavnunim* has the same root as *gevinah*, Hebrew for cheese.

6. Another explanation for eating cheese is that by the time the Israelites received the Ten Commandments and returned to their camp, too much time had passed and their milk had turned sour - the first step in making cheese.

7. Tradition points out that after receiving the Torah and the laws of Kashrut, the Jews would not eat the meat meals they prepared beforehand or use any of the cooking utensils now unkosher. Thus it was necessary to eat dairy products on the first Shavuot. Enough reasons for eating dairy? Let's move on.

I think of kugel when I think of Shavuot. It can be made with so many ingredients, and as you know, can be dairy or non-dairy. But because we are looking at Shavuot recipes, the one I am including is dairy. It appears in our library's loose-leaf binder and is titled <u>Kugel</u>. It was put together by our beloved Richard Schnabolk. This particular recipe uses not one or two, but three different cheeses. If you are making a holiday dish, why not make it as decadent as you can! (Just a note - there are also low fat kugel recipes to be found in Richard's collection). But this memorable one is called "Ann's Kugel".

Ingredients:

1 (8 0z) package large egg noodles

3/4 of a package cream cheese (6oz), softened

6 Tbs butter, sliced

4 Tbs sour cream

6 eggs, separated

1 (16 oz) package of cottage cheese, creamed

1/2 cup of white sugar & a pinch of salt

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

2. Grease a 9 x 13 inch glass baking dish.

3. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add noodles and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente; drain and stir in 6 Tbs sliced butter. 4. In a medium bowl beat egg yolks with sugar and cream cheese; Stir into noodles. 5. Add sour cream, cottage cheese and salt.

6. In a separate bowl, beat egg whites until stiff - fold the beaten egg whites into the noodle mixture.

7. Transfer mixture to prepared baking dish.

8. In still another small bowl, combine melted butter, 1/4 cup sugar, and graham cracker crumbs.

9. Sprinkle over the top of the noodle mixture in. 10. Bake in preheated oven for 60 minutes.

Note: If you want to add raisins, do so after soaking them in very hot water for 15 minutes.

You will now eat the best kugel you have ever tasted!

Other recipes in this collection include kugels that are made with thin egg noodles rather than the wide ones, recipes with fewer cheese ingredients, a recipe using four cheeses, and recipes with added ingredients such as mandarin oranges and also pineapple.

However, no one says you have to make kugel for your Shavuot dairy dish. In our library's cookbook, <u>Jewish Holiday</u> <u>Kitchen</u> by the well-known Joan Nathan, a choice to use is the "Lox Brunch Spread". It's really easy to make. Here it is:

Ingredients

1/2 cup finely minced onion 1/2 pound lox (smoked salmon), shredded 3 tsp chopped dill 4 tsp prepared horseradish 1/4 cup sour cream

Directions

Mix all ingredients well, adjusting to taste. Let stand, covered, a few hours for tastes to blend. Serve on thick slices of pumpernickel or bagels

Nathan has a collection of Shavuot recipes. Other ideas are soups such as "Cherry Soup" and "Palestinian Fruit Soup". Of course, you can always rely on your old stand-bys : borscht with sour cream and what about blintzes? However, in this book you will also find recipes such as fish with sour cream and the original blintzes served at Grossinger's.

It's always enjoyable to find meaning in our holidays with the foods we prepare. Shavuot is just one of them. I know you have your own recipes, but why not try a new one? Enjoy your culinary experiences!




