

Here we are - almost at the beginning of the last book of the 5 books, Deuteronomy. We're also at the beginning of summer, the months of July and August. While this is usually the time to wish everyone a wonderful and well deserved summer vacation, a trick has been played on all of us. The Jewish calendar has fulfilled the age old prophesy regarding whether the High Holidays come early or late...

Well - as hard as it is to believe, Erev Rosh haShanah is Monday Night September 6, and by the time we get to Simchat Torah, it will be the end of September. That means, planning is already underway for next year's holidays and events.



There are things planned for these upcoming 2 summer months (look through the Shofar for notices) and we are already taking a deep look at planning a very busy and exciting year ahead. The world was cheated out of a year plus, and we are going to try and make up for it as much as we can!



### THE STAMP CORNER by Ellis Bromberg



#### TISHA B'AV: THE SADDEST DAY ON THE JEWISH CALENDAR

This month's featured postage stamp is from Israel, issued in 2003. It depicts the Menorah from the Second Temple, which was made of gold and sanctified for hundreds of years until the destruction of the Temple by the Roman army, led by Titus, in 70 C.E. After the sacking of Jerusalem, the Romans held a triumphant procession, parading the sacred vessels through the streets of Rome. An illustration of that event was engraved in a stone victory arch -- the Arch of Titus -- built in Rome and still standing, that shows Judean prisoners carrying the looted items with the Menorah at the center. The infamous procession is depicted on the tab at the bottom of the stamp.

The subject of the stamp is related to the annual fast day Tisha B'Av (the 9th of Av) which begins this year at sundown on the evening of July 17. The day commemorates multiple tragedies in Jewish history, most notably the destruction of both the First and Second Temples, but also God decreeing that the Israelites would wander the desert for 40 years, as well as the expulsions of Jews from England in 1290 and from Spain in 1492. It's no wonder that Tisha B'av is often called "the saddest day on the Jewish calendar," even more somber than Yom Kippur.

According to written descriptions, the golden Menorah actually had a tripod base, not the solid one depicted on the Arch of Titus and the stamp. In addition, animal reliefs, which did not exist in Jewish art of the Second Temple era, appear on the base of the Titus Arch Menorah; these are pagan images that may have been added by the Romans.

Nevertheless, it was the depiction of the Menorah in the Titus Arch that Israel selected as its official emblem in 1949, nine months after it declared its independence. That is because the procession in Rome represented the destruction of Jewish independence -- and two thousand years later, independence was restored in the new State of Israel.





Welcome back to the second part of the review of <u>The Jewish Confederates</u>. I'll continue with the next part of the book.

4. Part 2 - "Be Strong and of a Good Courage" Chapter 3 - "Hebrew Officers and Israelite Gentlemen"

This chapter tells us of the make-up of the Jewish soldiers. Some were from old Sephardic families and others were from old Southern families whose ancestors (both Ashkenazi and Sephardic) had settled in the South generations before the Civil War. Their backgrounds differed. Those from the older families knew the South for a long time, but many younger officers had grown up as children in a very partisan environment where people were very defensive about slavery and were hostile to what they saw as Northern aggression. Some Jewish officers were first generation immigrants. In the South, Jewish officers were accepted and respected by both their superiors and their subordinates. There were very few acts of anti-Semitism directed against Jewish officers But you should know there were no Jewish Confederate generals and few colonels due to the lack of military traditions among Jews in the nineteenth century. In this chapter, you will see the specifics of the part played by Jewish soldiers during individual battles. You will also become acquainted with a number of Jewish doctors, surgeons, and assistant surgeons who served in the Confederate army.

5 Part 2, Chapter 4 - "Jewish Johnny Rebs"

This section specifically discusses the Jewish Confederate soldiers. We do not know how many Jewish men served in the Confederate armed forces, because the Confederate and Union armed forces did not record the men's religion, many Jewish communal records were destroyed or lost, and because many Jews were not affiliated with their synagogues. It is possible there were 2,000-3,000 Jewish Confederate soldiers, but record keeping was unreliable in the South. There were units with many Jews in them, but because Louisiana had the largest Jewish population, there was one unit, Company K-11th Louisiana Infantry, that was the closest thing to a "Jewish Company".

Actually, when the war began, Jews were just as anxious as non-Jews to enlist. Most believed the war would be short and they didn't want to miss anything. This section gives many details about individual Jewish soldiers and their units. We become familiar with the rabbis or Jewish "ministers" and laymen who ministered to the Jewish Confederates. Also, every Jew in the Confederate Army were volunteers - not one was conscripted.

6. Part 3 - "Sympathetic Souls and Busy Hands"

Chapter 5 - "This Most Suffering Land"

In Chapter 5, there is an interesting discussion of the homefront. It informs us how women , the eldely, the young and those who were unable to serve in the armed forces made contributions to help the war effort, and how they too suffered during the war. Read about the role of Jewish women who nursed the wounded, knitted clothing and were involved in war-related activities. You would be amazed at how women reacted under Northern military rule, such as wearing black armbands and actually making faces at Union soldiers and refusing to sit in the same trolley car with them. This chapter also discusses the results of Northerners coming into the South and unfortunately bringing anti-Semitism with them.

Part 3, chapter 6 - "Two Jewish Confederate Sisters"

Here you will meet Eugenia and Phoebe Levy who were born in Charleston. Become familiar with them and their families as they grew up in the South. They are the example of how some Southern families were split in their beliefs about slavery and secession.

Part 4 - "In Our Unhappy Land" Chapter 7 - ""Lead Out the Pageant: Sad and Slow"

In this chapter we are given the information leading up to the end of the war, starting in 1864 with Sherman's March to the Sea. In Georgia, some Jews were forced to leave their homes as Union forces took them over. Charleston became a city of ruins, with the destruction of synagogues, Jewish homes and businesses. One Hebrew congregation there had the Five Books of Moses and other valuables destroyed. But not one Jew left with the Yankees. The congregation of Beth Elohim sent their valuables to Columbia for safe-keeping - including its Torah, chandelier, and other items. Places like Columbia were damaged both by Union troops and the retreating Confederate Army.

Other places suffered greatly. Secretary of State Judah Benjamin destroyed all "documents, correspondence, official records and anything else to avoid embarrassment if found by the Yankees." He personally destroyed Secret Service records and fled from Richmond with the presidential party and decided the cause was lost, and he would try to escape or die trying saying "I will never be taken alive". He fled disguised as a Frenchman who could not speak English, with a false passport with the name M. Bomfals and finally made his way to the west coast of Florida where he hid in swamps. After four months of running, he left by boat (which sank), then a smaller boat and finally landed in England. Other Jews are described in this chapter - most families devastated by the war. Confederate Jewish soldiers returned home to rebuild their lives. Bitter feelings and homelessness remained among them., just as the rest of the population.

Part 4, chapter 8 - "We Are Passing Another Captivity"

The Civil War brought gloom and despair to both the Jewish and non-Jewish Confederates. The greatest losses suffered by Jews were felt by the few Sephardim that remained. One family alone had five cousins killed. Many Jews saw the Union occupation and Reconstruction as a modern-day version of the Jewish exile in Babylonia after the destruction of the Jewish state. Many Jewish communities and congregations were decimated. Economic life in places came to a standstill. This chapter gives you the details of what happened to some congregations, and the poverty that took over. All the while, new Jews entered the scene - coming from Germany, Poland, Russia, and the North during Reconstruction. They all played a large role in rebuilding Atlanta, Memphis, and Richmond.. Read about the Lehman brothers and their rejuvenated business after the war and about David Yulee who pursued his railroad and farming ventures in Florida. Quite a few Southern Jews are highlighted in chapter 8.

Epilogue - "It Seems Like a Dream As We Look Back"

This last part of the book has a discussion about why Judah Benjamin's memory survived in the South. Two rabbis give their ideas about this topic. Other Jews and their families, previously mentioned in the book, are mentioned here also, as we examine their lives after the war. Many remained in the South, some moved to the North, including the Baruchs, whose son Bernard became the most successful financier of his time. But Simon Baruch, his father, never forgot his Southern heritage. This was true of the few remaining Southern Jewish families who also joined the Sons of Confederate Veterans and the United Daughters of the Confederacy as late as the 1890's. In the 1880's, when the czar of Russia began a campaign of terror against the Jews of his empire, they fled in large numbers to the U.S.. Some came to the South and founded their own institutions and communities - even though most of them never knew the Jewish families in their own Southern cities and towns. These newcomers gradually took over the older congregations, and never knew much Confederate leaders, and knew little about sacrifices made during the Civil War. The older world of Southern Jewry disappeared, including old synagogues of the Confederacy. Only a few remained.

This book is extremely interesting to read even though it contains a huge amount of facts. I just gave you a very small taste of what it contains. Many illustrations were included. Don't forget, we had photography at that time. See the list of them in the appendix near the front of the book. This book was well-organized in tracing the history and the lives of individuals, families, and places. One thing I really found interesting was the depth of Jewish commitment to the Confederate cause. But all is explained! History buffs, you have quite a few pages to explore and enjoy! To be honest, you really don"t have to be a history buff -so many interesting details are in the book.




