From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson

We now, as June is upon us, start the fourth book of the Torah, "Numbers". In actuality, the Hebrew name of Bemidbar or "in the desert". It starts with a census of the people as they begin their journey from slavery towards freedom. Interestingly, we are commanded by God to rise to hear God's words and not to kneel. We are "raised up" by the words of Adonai and the requirements they place on us as Jews. It then continues to reiterate the



laws and commandments of God to us as partners in the creation of a better world.

Lately, it feels as if we have lost our way. Without getting into the gun ownership debate, I am deeply challenged by the barrage of multi-injury events that take place and how many of them involve guns of outlandish proportionality to needs of reasonable people. The need to protect the general community is far outweighed by fantasies of mostly young, irrational American youth looking for a way to become "somebody" in our society and their lives.

Society has taught a generation to disconnect with a reality many of us grew up with; the need to speak to others face to face, the act of communication, the need to comprehend, by looking at the faces of those we are trying to connect with. Our society is allowing us to step away from the biblical sense of community by allowing us to hide behind screens and not have the need, or capability, to learn the nuance of connection to each other. Some have turned to unreasonable weaponry as an act of speech, not protection.

Perhaps a minimum, a 2 year college degree should be required to get a gun. At least a high school education that requires people to learn the art of communication.

I don't know if those concepts can help, but where we are is certainly not where God wanted us to be. We are failing Gods test of our ability to function within the commanded mitzvot.

Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow

This month's review is a continuation of *Self Portrait of a Hero*, which are the letters of Jonathan Netanyahu from 1965-1976. Chapter 2 is our starting point.

Chapter 2 - "Zahal (1964-67) In July 1964, Yoni returned to Israel to enlist in the army. His parents and two younger brothers remained in the U.S. One can tell how close he was with his family. While in the Army (Zahal), he volunteered for the paratroopers, an elite corps. Yoni took part in Israel's raid in Jordan. In his letters, we see how he became an excellent soldier and then an outstanding officer. He writes:

To his parents when he returns to Israel - "When I saw the country from the plane, I felt a twinge in my heart. Despite everything that's wrong here, and God knows there are many faults and evil's, it's our country, and I love her as I always have. The young people here are more serious, thoughtful and mature than those in America, and the social climate-for us at any rate-is far healthier than in the States."

His admiration for his father is shown in this letter to him. "Do you know what is in my heart right now? Words cannot express all I feel upon the completion of your great work, which is only the beginning, I have never told you how proud I am of your being the man you are, of my being your son."

Among other things, this chapter includes topics such as: tremendously difficult training procedures in the dunes, the beauty of Israel, and a rough sandstorm. Yoni's details make it seem as if you are there!

Chapter 3 - "The Six Day War (1967)" Preparing to return to the U.S. to attend Harvard, Yoni decided to stay as tensions mounted in Israel. Egypt had blocked the Straits of Tehran, a southern sea lane for Israel, violating international law. Yoni was then called up as Israel prepared her forces, and on June 5, 1967, war broke out. By June 11th, the war ended. Israel had won. As a reserve paratrooper, Yoni took part in several important battles. Four hours before the end of the war, Yoni was badly wounded in the elbow as he tried to help a fellow wounded soldier. Unfortunately, he was bleeding profusely and then collapsed and fainted. After two operations in two different hospitals, Yoni was released as a disabled veteran. His letters tell us all of this. To his parents he wrote: "You should have seen our men fighting! There's no army like ours! None! It's an army that only wants peace and doesn't look for war, yet when it has to fight, there's no power that can stop it."

After being wounded, he writes to his parents "For me it's enough to be alive. ... When you see death face-to-face, when you know there is every chance that you too may die; when you are wounded, and alone, and in the midst of a scorched field, surrounded by smoke,...with your arm shattered and burning with a terrible pain-...then life becomes more precious and craved-for than ever. You want to embrace it and go on with it,...to live, live, even without hands and feet, but breathing, thinking, feeling, seeing and taking in sensation."

Chapter 4 - "Harvard and the Hebrew University ((1967-69)" - During the time period of this chapter, Yoni often saw his parents, so there are very few letters written to them. He mostly writes to his brothers in Israel. Yoni attended Harvard for one year and began studying at Hebrew University, but only after one term, he decided to go back to the army. In this chapter, he writes about such things as: How to use a map, the beauty about training in the mud, assimilation of the Jews, Canadian scenery, and being in the top 10% of his class, Jordan receiving arms from the U.S., doubts about continuing his education and his decision to return to the army. In the following letter, he mentions the problem of being obligated to other nations. He writes: "We're surrounded by enemies, and it looks as if we can rely only on ourselves. If only we could fight without being obliged to get help from the great powers. But that isn't realistic. The great powers can play with us like a wind-tossed leaf if they reach an agreement among themselves. It's an unpleasant feeling, this business of being every-body's football. I have no faith at all in the judgement of the United States. Hope my misgivings are wrong."

Chapter 5 - "Zahal Again: In an Elite Unit (1969-73)" Yoni's decision to return to the army was in 1969. Units attacked deep within Arab territory to destroy the terrorist bases. In his letters, Yoni does not mention any military operations. Much of the information was to be kept secret for the time being. But the attack on PLO headquarters in Beirut was discussed. It was in 1972, where three leading members were killed. Yoni also commanded the snatching of Syrian generals on the Lebanese border so that they could be exchanged for

Israeli pilots in Syrian jails. By 1972 he rose to the rank of major, then enrolled in summer school at Harvard. Later, he returned to Israel. I am sharing parts of two letters with you because

they surely give you a good idea about his feelings. To his parents he wrote about turning 23: "Time flies, doesn't it? My years bear down on me with all their weight. Not as a load or burden, but as the sum of all the long and short moments that have gone into them. On me, on us, the young men of Israel, rests the duty of keeping our country safe. This is a heavy responsibility, which matures us early. It seems that the young Israeli belongs to a special breed of men. It's hard to explain this, but it can be felt....I'll be twenty- three, and I do not regret what I have done and what I'm about to do....I believe in myself, in my country and in my future. I also believe in my family. " Next, before going back to Harvard, Yoni writes to a friend: "America is as I remembered it. A country that moves you to pity on the one hand and honest admiration on the other. Pity because young people here are caught up in the toils of endless frustration and seem unable to progress beyond the infantile stage." (Here he has some negative things to say about hippies). You feel sorry for America. On the other hand, there's no end to my admiration. This country is colossal!

Just - in technology, achievement, efficiency, courtesy, order, convenience and such they are ten times better than the rest of the world (and fifty times better than Israel).

Ch. 6 - "From the Yom Kippur War to Operation Jonathan (1973-76)" – When war broke out on Oct. 6, 1973, Yoni was first in command of his unit in the Golan Heights. It was he who bravely ran in front of eight of his men and destroyed the enemy force. In all, Yoni's force of about 30 men annihilated the Syrian commando force of about 45 men, suffering only 2 casualties. Another important part Yoni played was the deployment of the army's 175 mm. cannons to firing positions on the outskirts of Damascus Yoni's intelligence was vital to the recapture of Mt. Hermon. In this chapter, Yoni writes about Israeli feelings about the war, , .the strength of the nation during crises, ugliness highlights beauty, how he relaxes, how he feels about killing at close range for the first time, Passover and the idea of freedom, and the gap between political and daily life. The last letter in the book, only 5 days before he was killed in Uganda, deals with an inner crisis: he writes to his girlfriend: "I find myself at a critical stage in my life, facing a profound inner crisis that has been disturbing my whole frame of reference for a long time. ... I am tired most of the time, but that's only part of the problem....I have lost the spark that is so vital for any achievement, the spark of creative joy, of selfrenewal, of reawakening.... I do things because they have to be done, and not because I want to.... ves. I'm having a hard time as seldom before in my life, and what troubles me is that even the alternatives outside the army have lost much of their luster. I've got to stop and get off now, at once, or very soon- and I shall, but in a while....It'll be okay." And he did get off, not by his own doing, but by his being killed at Entebbe not long after this letter.

Do not forget to read the Afterword. It notes certain lines of development in Yoni's thinking. To be honest, I did not think I would get so much from this book, but as time went on, I realized I had a jewel in my hand. Yoni wrote letters that few of us have ever written. These letters are so detailed and full of personal feeling. I felt I really knew him, and I grew to respect him as a soldier and as a human being.

Let me explain why this idea is far from silly, far from ineffective and, in fact, is seen as quite shrewd.

If someone enters our building, their eyes are scanning the room. They are not looking down. While we are trying to divert the eyes of the intruder, we are trying to get down on the ground to hopefully avoid being seen and targeted. Here's where golf balls, or big cats eye marbles can, in fact, SAVE LIVES.

We are looking to collect golf balls, range balls, balls you golfers won't use on the course. Bring them in baggies, or loose, which we will put in the back pockets of the seats in the sanctuary.

If an intruder enters, as we slide to the ground, take the golf balls and roll them or throw them on the floor towards the intruder. The distraction caused will force him/them to begin looking down to not step on them. Or to figure out how to step around them. This creates a distraction allowing us more options for safe resolution of the threat. If you can, please take several large baggies, and fill them with golf balls, making sure the bag securely closes. We'll be collecting them for the foreseeable future. We'll have a collection barrel in the lobby

Trust law enforcement and your security committee. Sometimes, the easiest, simplest idea can be the best.

As we continue to securitize our building even more, please do your part. Talk to your friends who play golf. Just-whatever you do: Don't laugh:

The ball you roll can save the day or lives.



THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ By Ellis Bromberg



This month's featured stamp was the first Israeli commemorative issued to mark Yom HaZikaron, Israel's Memorial Day, which begins this year at sundown on Tuesday, May 3, and ends at nightfall on Wednesday, May 4 (the 4th of Iyyar). Enacted into law in 1963, Yom HaZikaron was traditionally dedicated to fallen soldiers, but has been extended to commemorate civilian victims of terrorism.

The 1966 stamp depicts the monument to the liberators of the Lower Galilee, the Israeli Haganah army that fought to free Galilee from Syria, which invaded the area in 1948. Located in Tiberias, this is one of eight monuments built where historic battles were fought during Israel's War of Independence. It is located on a hilltop, visible from afar, its two triangular masses representing a Star of David: one pointing skyward to symbolize the victory of the liberators, the second pointing earthward indicating the union of the fallen with the living. Its light colored stone is from quarries in the Lower Galilee.

According to Israeli law, all places of entertainment in the country are closed beginning on erev Yom HaZikaron; Israel's president broadcasts a condolence speech to bereaved families; and government officials join ceremonies in memory of the fallen heroes. The day immediately precedes Yom Ha'atzmaut, Israel's Independence Day, a symbol of the biblical theme that "joy follows mourning."

The inscription on the tab (the label beneath the stamp) reads "Memorial Day for the fallen of Israel's Defense Force. Ministry of Defense 5726-1966."






