
Dear Sisterhood ladies!

BROTHERHOOD NEWS:


Hope everyone had a healthy and enjoyable summer - and now we're preparing for the fall.


We are pleased to say that Ms. Rhoda will be back with us, and Rabbi Bruce will also be involved in teaching as well as creating the roadmap for our students.

THE STAMP CORNER THE LONG TRADITION OF JEWISH NEW YEAR'S DAY CARDS ~~ by Ellis Bromberg

The sending of Christmas/New Year's cards in America and Europe has been a well-established tradition since the 19th century. In the U.S., approximately 1.3 billion cards are mailed each year, and in the U.K., the Royal Mail estimates it delivers 150 million cards during the Christmas period. Besides the British and Americans, the Dutch, the Danes, the Finns, and the French send the most Christmas cards per household.

But contrary to popular belief, Jewish New Year cards predate the Christian tradition by several centuries, and today, hundreds of thousands of cards celebrating Rosh Hashanah are mailed every year throughout the Jewish world.

In 2022, Rosh Hashanah begins on the evening of Sunday, September 25 (the 29th of Elul, 5782), and ends on the evening of Tuesday, September 27 (the 2nd of Tishrei, 5783). This month, we feature a three-set issue of Israeli commemoratives that depict three vintage Jewish New Year postcards, one each from Poland, Germany, and the United States.

As far back as 14th century Germany, rabbis recommended that letters sent during the month of Elul open with the blessing "May you be inscribed and sealed for a good year." This German-Jewish custom reached even broader popularity with the invention, in 1869, of the postal card, and within a few years, illustrations with beloved and familiar topics were added to the plain postcard.

Today, most New Year's cards are greeting cards mailed in envelopes, but that wasn't the case at the turn of the 20th century. Then, most were postcards, and the illustrations on this month's featured stamps are from actual postcards.

In the United States, two major changes in postal policy led to what was called the "postal card craze" which spanned about 20 years, and corresponded with the flourishing of the Jewish New Year postcard in the U.S. and Europe. In 1898, the rate to send a postcard was lowered by the U.S. Post Office Department to one cent (it had been two cents, the same as the charge for letters); then, in 1899, the U.S. launched Rural Free Delivery, which enabled home mail pickup and delivery at all residences, obviating a long trip to the nearest post office.

The cards were printed primarily in Germany, Poland, and the U.S. The makers of the Jewish cards in Warsaw preferred to depict the religious life of Eastern European Jewry; though the images on their cards were often theatrically staged in a studio with amateur actors, they preserve views and customs lost in the Holocaust. German cards were frequently illustrated with biblical themes, such as the Giving of the Law or the Binding of Isaac. In the United States, the mass immigration of Jews from Eastern Europe in the first decades of the 20th century gave a new boost to the production of the cards. The colorful and elaborate new cards, primarily printed in New York City, depicted America as the new homeland, widely opening her arms to immigrants; other American cards emphasized the Zionist ideology and depicted contemporary views of Israel.

The three stamps in this month's featured set are reproductions of Jewish New Year cards from the turn of the 20th century. The Polish card (1.20 shekels stamp) shows a boy kneeling by a girl, giving her a gift. The German card (1.90 shekels stamp) depicts a young woman holding the Zionist blue and white flag. The American card (2.30 shekels stamp) shows a young man presenting a young woman with flowers and New Year's greetings. The original postcards are part of an impressive collection assembled by Hayim Shtayer, a graphic designer and collector from Haifa. In 2001, Israel issued a similar set of New Year card stamps; the second set, also from Shtayer's collection, features artwork created in Israel during its first years of independence. Appropriately, both sets were issued in time for Rosh Hashanah mailings in 2000 and 2001.

Honoring JEWISH HERITAGE

THE U.S. AND THE HOLOCAUST

Premieres September 18, 19 and 20, at 8PM with an encore at 10PM on WPBT & WXEL

A new three-part documentary directed and produced by Ken Burns, Lynn Novick and Sarah Botstein explores America's response to one of the greatest humanitarian crises in history. Narrated by Peter Coyote. Voice Actors Include Liam Neeson, Matthew Rhys, Helena Zengel, Paul Giamatti, Meryl Streep, Werner Herzog, Joe Morton, Hope Davis, Bradley Whitford and Helena Zengel.

Inspired in part by the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum's "Americans and the Holocaust" exhibition and supported by its historical resources, the film examines the rise of Hitler and Nazism in Germany in the context of global antisemitism and racism, the eugenics movement in the United States and race laws in the American south. The series, written by Geoffrey Ward, sheds light on what the U.S. government and American people knew and did as the catastrophe unfolded in Europe.

"History cannot be looked at in isolation," stated Ken Burns. "While we rightly celebrate American ideals of democracy and our history as a nation of immigrants, we must also grapple with the fact that American institutions and policies, like segregation and the brutal treatment of indigenous populations, were influential in Hitler's Germany. And it cannot be denied that, although we accepted more refugees than any other sovereign nation, America could have done so much more to help the millions of desperate people fleeing Nazi persecution."

The History of the Talis

The Talis....a religious symbol....a garment....a shroud....a canopy.... cloak which envelopes both physically and spiritually.

In prayer and celebration....joy and sorrow....the talis has followed us through the centuries. The Talis is present at all of the major occasions in our lives: circumcision, bar/bat mitzvah, wedding and burial.

Throughout the ages various styles of talasim arose. Yemenite Jews have an all black talis which is worn during a period of mourning - German Jews wear an all white talis on Yom Kippur. Old Talisim are scarce because of the beautiful tradition: burial in the talis a man had prayed in.

Today's talis is from ancient garb; it has its origin in the biblical commandment to wear fringes. In the desert the ancient Bedouins wore woven cloaks not unlike the four-cornered Abaya they wear currently. Putting fringes on their garments was one of the first commandments fulfilled by the Israelites after Moses descended from Sinai with the Torah.

As styles changed religious Jews quickly designed special four-cornered garments to preserve this symbol of the commandments. The talis has been a Jewish tradition for centuries and it was believed that beauty added to religious experiences.

Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow



The High Holy days are around the corner. Unbelievable! I think I am now a firm believer in the words "time flies". Who knew a year could go by so quickly?

For my Rosh Hashanah book selection, I am returning to the cookbook which I used for Passover recipes - *L'Dor V'Dor*. But for the New Year, I have chosen one recipe which uses honey as one of its main ingredients, and another uses both apples *and* honey. I hope you will enjoy them and decide to use at

least one of them for the upcoming holidays. The first recipe is for a main meal, located on page 80 –

"East Honey Chicken". 1 cup honey 1/2 tsp regular mustard

2T. curry powder 3-1b. chicken

Mix honey, mustard and curry in a large baking dish. Coat chicken in mixture. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees. Turn to glaze underside for at least 5 minutes. Serve over rice. Easy and yummy.

If you prefer a slightly different honey-mustard recipe, another one is located on the next page. It uses Dijon-style mustard and possibly onion and garlic. The choice is yours!

The second recipe is one which uses apples *and* honey, located at the bottom of page 15 -

"Kugel". 1 C. cottage cheese 1 C. sour cream 8 oz. cream cheese 5 eggs, beaten 2C. apples, chopped 1/2 C. honey or sugar

1 tsp. ground cinnamon 1/2 tsp. salt 7 C. (16 oz.) wide egg noodles, cooked and drained 1/2 C. (1 stick) butter, melted 1/2 C. raisins, optional

Mix the first 8 ingredients together in a large bowl until well blended. Add noodles, apples and raisins. Mix well. Spoon into a greased 13x9" baking dish. Sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar, if desired. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 55 minutes or until set. Serves 12.

Besides the above two recipes, this book has some others you might find interesting for Rosh Hashanah. I will list them below with the corresponding page on which you will find them.

I hope many of you will use a new recipe for the New Year. Perhaps one of them will be from this book. They will surely find a good home on your holiday table among your other prepared dishes that have appeared in the past. 




