### From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson

The summer months are upon us, and they seemingly arrived so quickly this year.

While down time is what we look forward to, here at the temple we are already planning some of the most exciting events for the next year.

We are, in the reading of Torah, in the book of Numbers. The Israelites are challenging Moses and Aaron as they are standing at the precipice of the promised land. A place they have heard much about, but actually know very little.



They are visioning the land through their own ideas, dreams and hopes. Life is about to change. At the last second, they become frightened as they realize they have imagined the future but have no real plan for what to DO when they get there. All will be beautiful and pretty much perfect.

In probability, our expectations haven't been fully realized. Arrival requires redefinition- redefining our plans, our visions, our hopes and so much more.



This spring Brotherhood is bringing back cruise asea. See flyer in this edition of The Shofar.



## THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ By Ellis BrombergStamp Of the Month:CLANDESTINE IMMIGRATION TO ISRAEL: THE EXODUS 1947



The story of the *Haganah Ship Exodus 1947* inspired a bestselling novel by Leon Uris, a major motion picture starring Paul Newman and Eva Marie Saint, and a tune composed by Ernest Gold that was named Song of the Year at the 1961 Grammy Awards. This month marks the 76th year since the departure of the *Exodus*, the most famous clandestine immigrant ship, from France to Israel. Our featured stamp, issued by Israel in 1997 to mark the 50th anniversary of the event, depicts the famous ship.

Organized clandestine immigration operations carried out from 1934-1948 were an integral part of the plan both to establish a Jewish majority in the land of Israel and to attain recognition of the political right of Jews to settle in the land. These operations sought to open the country's gates in preparation for the establishment of a Jewish state. But Great Britain, which held the mandate over Palestine, enforced a deportation policy intended to deter both the clandestine immigrants and the organizers of the operations; from 1946 until the establishment of the State of Israel, the British deported 52,000 clandestine immigrants to detention camps in Cyprus. Nevertheless, the Organized Clandestine Immigration Operations, during its 14 years of activity, successfully brought over 122,000 people to Palestine, most by way of the sea; the majority, some 85,000, entered the country following World War II as efforts increased to open the land to Holocaust survivors.

Undoubtedly, the best known of the clandestine immigrant ships was the *Exodus*. The Haganah, the Zionist group organizing the operations, had been using smaller ships for clandestine Jewish immigration, but decided it needed a larger one to start moving thousands of refugees. The *Exodus* was a worn-out American coastal freight passenger ship launched in 1928; originally called the *SS President Warfield*. she sailed the Chesa-

peake Bay between Baltimore, Maryland, and Norfolk, Virginia, for over a decade. Transferred to the British under the Lend-Lease agreement as one of a group of shallow-draft ships, the *President Warfield* was later deployed in the 1944 Normandy invasion. After World War II, she was returned to U.S. waters in very poor condition, but with aid from the Baltimore Jewish community, she was repaired, retrofitted to accommodate 4000 passengers, and rechristened the *Exodus*, one of ten ships purchased by the North American Jewish community.

After the ship was made seaworthy, she was transferred to the French port of Sete, near Marseilles. On July 11, 1947, the *Exodus* set sail for Israel carrying 4530 Holocaust survivors, including 655 children, as clandestine immigrants. It was a most trying journey. One woman died in childbirth; her infant son died a few weeks later. Two British destroyers tailed the *Exodus* to the shores of Israel, and together with four other destroyers, attacked the ship. A battle ensued with the British using tear gas and firearms while *Exodus* passengers defended themselves using tin cans, potatoes, and bottles. The battle ended with three fatalities -- two immigrants and one American volunteer -- and 200 wounded.

On July 18, 1947, British forces dragged the ship into the port of Haifa. Heartbreakingly close to their new homeland, the immigrants were forced onto three deportation ships. Instead of sending them to Cyprus, where other illegal immigrants were imprisoned, the British government decided to make an example of the *Exodus* in order to discourage future attempts to reach Palestine, and ordered the refugees to be sent back to France. The immigrants spent 24 days at Port-de-Bouc in southern France during a heat wave, suffering from a shortage of food and abominable sanitary conditions. Finally, the passengers were deported to Hamburg, then part of the British occupation zone in Germany, forcibly taken off the ship and transported to two internment camps near the city of Lubeck in northern Germany.

The painful deportation to Germany so soon after the Holocaust caused an international uproar. Displaced persons in camps all over Europe protested vociferously and staged hunger strikes when they heard the news. Large demonstrations erupted on both sides of the Atlantic. The ensuing public embarrassment for Britain played a significant role in the diplomatic swing of sympathy toward the Jews. The United Nations Special Committee on Palestine was conducting an investigation to determine how to resolve the conflicting demands of the Zionists and Arabs; the treatment of the *Exodus* refugees apparently influenced some members to advocate for a solution that would allow Jews to immigrate freely to a state of their own. And in November 1947, the U.N. resolved to create an independent state for the Jewish people in Israel.

Of the would-be *Exodus* immigrants, many renewed their attempts to reach Palestine, and most succeeded by the time Israel declared its independence in May 1948. Others who had been moved to internment camps in Cyprus were transferred to Israel when Britain formally recognized the State of Israel in January 1949.

After the *Exodus* was decommissioned, plans were approved to convert her into a floating museum in the port of Haifa. But as she was being restored, in 1952, a fire broke out and she burned down to her waterline. The hulk was scuttled.

Two significant relics of the *Exodus* were returned to the U.S.: her ship's bell is in the Mariners' Museum in Newport News, Virginia, and her steam whistle is on the roof of the New York Central Iron Works in Hagerstown, Maryland. Israel's monument to the ship is outside the International Cruise Ship Terminal in the port of Haifa; it is made of bronze in the shape of an anchor mounted on a relief map of the country, representing the role the *Exodus* played in the birth of the modern State of Israel.

The stamp shows the *Exodus* at the Haifa port in July 1947. On the left side is a photograph of the "shadow fleet" at Haifa, other clandestine immigration ships that were captured by the British fleet and whose passengers were detained in camps in Palestine and Cyprus. The tab, the label under the stamp, bears a quotation from the last lines of the Natan Alterman poem "We Were As Dreamers," first published in 1934. The poem references the first clandestine immigration ship that landed on the shores of Palestine in the summer of that year. Alterman finishes his poem with the message that the return to Zion -- immigration to Israel -- will be realized as prophesied in the Bible, Psalms 126.

### Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review......by Sheilah Korinow



It's that time of year again when many of us start thinking about what we might like to read over the summer (or is that an old, northern idea that we took advantage of as summer fast approached)? We visualized sipping a cold drink in our backyards and admired the comfortable summer breezes on porches that could be used from May through October.) But that was up north. What about here in the south with its scorching summer sun and the depressing high humidity? Do we still create a

summer reading list? Sure, why not have something to look forward to. As a result, I can still provide you with a few books that our library has which might interest you for this season.

1. The first book is by a well-known author - Nelson Demille. The name of the book is By the Rivers of Babylon. Demille is a former US Army lieutenant who served in Vietnam. He is the author of 19 novels, including NY Times bestsellers. He is a member of Mensa, the Author's Guild, past president of the Mystery Writers of America and a Book of the Month judge. He is also a member of the International Thriller Writers. He majored in Political Science and History in college - all feeding into his qualifications for being a great writer.

By the Rivers of Babylon was his first book, published in 1978. It involves two Concorde jets which leave Lod Airport in Israel, going to a UN conference, hopefully to bring peace to the Middle East. The planes carry all sorts of people and are covered by F-14 fighter jets, plus security individuals. Also on board is a bomb planted by a terrorist mastermind. They are forced to crash land at an ancient desert area. The face off is between the men and women of the peace mission with only a few weapons, and the army of Palestinian commandos. In the meantime, the Israeli authorities desperately attempt a rescue mission in a place called Babylon.

2. The second book on our summer reading list is Hotel Moscow by Talia Carner. The author was a professor, a marketing consult counselor and lecturer for the Small Business Administration among other activities. Her first novel, Puppet Child, launched nationwide legislation (the Protective Parent Reform Act) that became the platform for two state senatorial candidates.

This novel is about a 38-year-old NY investment manager and daughter of Jewish Holocaust survivors. Her life changes when her job is put in jeopardy in late September 1993. She had accepted an invitation to join a friend on a mission to Moscow to teach entrepreneurial skills to a Russian businesswoman, and in return she gains knowledge in the huge new emerging Russian market. But there was a large cost as a result of her involvement.

### **VOTER ALERT**

Florida canceled all standing requests for mail-in ballots effective January 1, 2023. Florida law SB-90, passed in 2021, imposed new rules on mail-in voting, effectively wiping out all existing applications for absentee ballots.

If you are a Florida resident who wishes to vote by mail in upcoming elections, you must now re-apply to receive a mail-in ballot, you will not automatically receive one. And you will have to renew your request with every new election cycle.

Online Voter Registration (OVR) is now available in Florida.

You can register to request an absentee ballot or update your voter registration information online from any computer or handheld device by logging on to: www.slcelections.com and follow the prompts.

Remember the MST 860 lesson: Indifference to government actions is the same as approval.
