

THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ 80th ANNIVERSARY OF THE SOBIBOR PRISONER REVOLT by Ellis Bromberg



This month marks the 80th anniversary of the mass uprising by the courageous prisoners at Sobibor, the largest Nazi extermination camp located in German-occupied Poland. The event was commemorated in a stamp issued by Russia in 2015.

Located in a forest near the village of Żłobek Duży in eastern Poland, Sobibor was opened in May 1942 as an extermination camp, not a concentration camp: it existed for the sole purpose of murdering Jews. The vast majority of prisoners were gassed within hours of arrival. Those not killed immediately were forced to assist in the camp operations, and few survived more than a few months. An estimated 170,000-250,000 people were murdered at Sobibor; the precise toll is unknown since no complete record survives, but the majority of those killed were Jews from the Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, Austria, the Netherlands, Belgium, and France. It was the fourth deadliest Nazi camp, after Auschwitz, Treblinka, and Belzec.

The prisoner revolt that took place on October 14, 1943, was the most successful uprising of Jewish prisoners at a Nazi extermination camp. The plan involved two phases. First, an hour before evening roll call, teams of prisoners were to lure the SS officers to secluded locations around the camp and kill them. In the second phase, the *kapos* (Jewish prisoners serving as administrators) would announce that the SS had ordered a special work detail in the forest outside the camp, and the entire group of 600 prisoners would calmly walk to freedom out the front gate. But the plan was disrupted after only eleven SS men had been killed. The prisoners had to escape by climbing over barbed wire fences and running through a minefield under heavy machine gun fire. About 300 prisoners made it out of the camp, although all but about 60 were later re-captured and killed.

Days after the revolt, SS Chief Heinrich Himmler ordered the death camp closed. It was demolished, bulldozed under the earth, and planted over with trees so the Nazis could hide their crimes from the advancing Russian Army. In the first decades after World War II, the site was neglected and the camp had little presence in either popular or scholarly accounts of the Holocaust. It became better known after it was portrayed in the 1978 TV miniseries *Holocaust* and the 1987 film *Escape from Sobibor*. The Sobibor Museum now stands at the site, which continues to be investigated by archaeologists.

The Russian stamp features a statue of a desperate mother with a child in her arms. Designed by Metchislav Walter, the sculpture was unveiled in 1965 in the place where the gas chambers were most likely located.





Celebrating Life...Our Family Understands Your Loss

Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow

Elinor and Robert Slater have given us two highly acclaimed books now located in our library - Great Jewish Women and Great Jewish Men. In them, they have discussed Jewish individuals who have greatly contributed to our civilization. Now another one of their books join these two

on our shelves - Great Moments in Jewish History. We should ask: What makes a moment "great" in Jewish history? The book's cover states that the Slaters "bring to life events that have shaped the character and essence of the Jewish People and have determined the course of their dramatic history." The authors have helped to organize the book in such a way that will lead you to understand, in an orderly manner, these great moments in Jewish history and where they fit in among all the others mentioned.

The authors have divided the book into four distinct sections: Moments of Courage, Moments of Joy, Moments of Despair, and Moments of Creativity. Each section consists of numerous examples of "great" moments. Each one starts with a very brief description of what the "great" moment is and how it fits into the surrounding time. Every article is short - only a few pages, yet it contains enough information to leave you with an understanding of its importance in Jewish history. It will certainly supply you with a decent amount of information to add to the knowledge you may or may not have. Let's now take a look at the four sections the authors created. I'll give you the titles of some of the articles included.

- 1. "Moments of Courage" Moses Leads Children of Israel Out of Egypt 13th century BCE, Israelites Receive the Ten Commandments 1230 BCE, Esther Saves Jews of Persia 465 BCE, Rothchilds Found a Banking Dynasty 1792, Brandeis Becomes First Jewish Supreme Court Justice January 28, 1916, the Haganah is Organized 1920, King David Hotel is Bombed July 22, 1946, 12:37 PM, World Learns of Israel's Nuclear Capability December 19, 1960, Entebbe Hostages Rescued in Darfing Mission July 3, 1976, 11:01 PM, and Israel Bombs Iraqi Nuclear Reactor June 7, 1981, 5:30 PM. Plus there are 13 other great moments of Courage.
- 2. "Moments of Joy" Abraham Passes Test of Faith 18th century, BCE, David Establishes Jerusalem As His Capital 990 BCE, Solomon Builds First Temple 950 BCE, Ba'al Shem Tov Founds Hasidic Movement 1736, Rebecca Gratz Introduces First Sunday School 1838, Ellis Island Receives Jews Arriving In America 1891, Dead Sea Scrolls Are Discovered 1947, United Nations Votes to Establish Jewish State November 29, 1947, Brandeis University Founded 1948, First Woman Rabbi Ordained June 3, 1972, Egyptian President Visits Israel November 19, 1977, and The Catholic Church reconciles With Jews June 15, 1994. There are 16 more fascinating articles.
- 3. "Moments of Despair" Solomon"s Empire Is Divided 925 BCE, First Temple Is Destroyed August 587 BCE, Zealots Commit Suicide At Masada 73 CE, Crusades Reach Holy Land 1099, First Blood Libel Unleashed 1144, Jews Expelled From Spain August 2, 1492, Shakespeare Reinforces Negative Image of Jews 1596, Dreyfus Arrested for Espionage October 15, 1894, Ford Sponsors Hate Literature October, 1920, Death Camp Built at Auschwitz June, 1940, Nazi Officials Design Final Solution January 20, 1942, Israeli Athletes Murdered at Munich Olympics September 5, 1972, and fourteen other interesting articles.
- 4. "Moments of Creativity" Babylonian Talmud Is Finalized 500, Rashi Composes Biblical Commentary 1100, Mapu Writes First Hebrew Novel 1853, First Kibbutz Is Founded At Degania 1909, Judith Kaplan Becomes First Bat Mitzvah 1922, Molly Goldberg Captivates American Audiences January 10, 1949,

Wiesel's Night Sensitizes World to Holocaust - 1960, Fiddler on the Roof Opens on Broadway - September 22, 1964, and and Spielberg Recreates Schindler's List - 1993. There are another 9 articles in this section.

The Slaters' book also includes numerous photos and sketches that will add even more to your knowledge and interest. One thing you should know is that Great Moments in Jewish History's copyright was in 1998. That leaves a number of years which included other events that might have been a part of this book had it been written in 2023. What about important moments such as the creation of the present government in Israel -the most right-wing and extreme one in Israel's history, the rise of antisemitism in the U.S., the first Jewish -American (Joseph Lieberman) to be nominated for a national office (V-P) by a major political party, the Al-Aqsa Infitada begins, the Jewish Museum of Turkey is founded by Turkish Jewry in 2001, the U.S. extends formal recognition of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel, and the United Arab Emirates sign a peace treaty with Israel in 2020. Are there any more you can think of? Now take these important moments and place them into the four categories used in the book. You've now added some meaningful information to the book. I'm sure some of what you wrote is the same as other readers but some will be different.

There is something else you should know. The authors admit that there will be legitimate differences of opinion over their selections of great moments in Jewish history. Which of their choices in the book should not have been included? It was no easy task to make these decisions, but the authors made them based on extensive research and also consultation with Jewish scholars. Their aim had been to "assemble a list that not only captures the key moments of Jewish history, but also reflects the diversity and breadth through the ages"

Quarter Auction

We have had many requests to explain a "Quarter Auction" so here is an explanation:

A **quarter auction** is a fundraising event that combines elements of a raffle, an auction, and a direct sales party. It's a fun way to raise money for a good cause while enjoying some friendly competition and socializing with others. Here's how it works:

Arrival: When you arrive at the event, you'll be given a numbered paddle for a donation. This paddle will have a corresponding numbered chip that will be placed into a drawing basket.

Preview: Before the auction begins, you'll have the opportunity to browse the items up for "auction." These items will be on display for about an hour after the doors open, allowing you to decide which ones you're interested in.

Bidding: Once the auction starts, an announcer or helper will hold up an item and announce whether it's a "one-quarter" or "two-quarter" bid. If you're interested in bidding, you'll put one or two quarters (depending on what was announced) into the bucket for each paddle you wish to bid with. For example, if you have two paddles and want to bid with both of them to increase your chances of winning, and the item is a "one-quarter" bid, you'll put \$0.50 in the bucket and raise your paddles. If you decide to bid with only one paddle, you'll pay \$0.25.

Collection: A worker will walk from table to table with a bucket to collect bids. Once all the quarters have been collected, the bucket is shaken to mix up all the chips.

Winner Selection: The announcer will draw a number from the bucket, and if they draw your number and you had bid on the item, congratulations! You've won that item at a great price. If they draw your number and you didn't bid on the item, simply call out "no bid!" and they'll continue drawing numbers until they find a winner.

Additional Activities: Quarter auctions may also include various raffles and cash-and-carry items throughout the evening.

Remember to bring quarters with you to the event; however, if you forget or run out, there will be rolls of quarters available for purchase. Enjoy the excitement of bidding on items while supporting a good cause!






