





THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ CELEBRATING THE BIRTHDAY OF LOUIS BRANDEIS, FIRST JEWISH U.S. SUPREME COURT JUSTICE by Ellis Bromberg



This month we mark the 157th anniversary of the birth of America's first Jewish U.S. Supreme Court Justice, Louis Brandeis. He was honored on this U.S. commemorative stamp in 2009.

He was born on November 13, 1856, in Louisville, Kentucky. Although he completed his secondary education in Germany, he returned to the United States where he studied law at Harvard University. After settling in Boston, Brandeis became a successful lawyer, spending a good deal of his time pursuing cases with a political bent. In particular, he became a leading figure in the antitrust movement at the turn of the century, fighting against the monopolization of the New England Railroad, and aiding the cause of the mini-

mum wage against companies opposed to it. He is also credited with developing the "right to priva-

cy" concept.

In 1912, he supported Woodrow Wilson's nomination for president, and in 1916, was appointed an associate justice on the Supreme Court, the first Jew ever to be appointed to the position. At the time of his nomination, the U.S. Senate had never before held a public hearing on a president's Supreme Court nominee; previously, all had been confirmed on the day of their nomination. But it took four months of committee hearings until the Senate brought the Brandeis nomination to a vote. It was bitterly contested because, as Justice William O. Douglas later wrote: "Brandeis was a militant crusader for social justice whoever his opponent might be. He was dangerous not only for his brilliance, his arithmetic, his courage. He was dangerous because he was incorruptible... [and] the fears of the Establishment were greater because Brandeis was the first Jew to be named to the Court." Brandeis was eventually confirmed in a Senate vote of 47-22.

He served on the Supreme Court until 1939, and was one of its most famous and influential figures. His opinions were some of the greatest defenses of freedom of speech and the right to privacy ever written. However, critics have noted that he consistently voted with the court majority in support of racial segregation.

He became active in Zionist affairs during World War I, seeing it as a solution to antisemitism

in Europe and Russia while being a way to "revive a sense of the Jewish spirit." He accepted the role of chairperson of the Provisional Executive Committee for General Zionist Af-

fairs, a group that ran Zionist affairs in America on behalf of the worldwide Zionist Organization. In this position, Brandeis had a major impact on the American branch of the Zionist movement, draw-

ing to it a number of sympathizers, and improving its organization and finances.

Even after he resigned his position, upon joining the U.S. Supreme Court, he worked behind the scenes to encourage President Wilson to support the Zionist cause. After the war, Brandeis headed a delegation of American Zionists at a conference in London where differences emerged between him and Chaim Weizmann, then the president of the worldwide Zionist Organization and later the first president of Israel. Arguments over the role of the organization and its pursuit of political activities caused a rift between the two men. After Weizmann gained the upper hand, Brandeis withdrew from most Zionist activities. He did, however, appeal to President Franklin Roosevelt in 1937 to oppose the British partition scheme, calling instead for all Palestine to become a Jewish national home.

In the announcement of the Brandeis stamp, the U.S. Postal Service credited him with being the justice "most responsible for helping the Supreme Court shape the tools it needed to interpret the Constitution in light of the sociological and economic conditions of the 20th century.... A progressive and champion of reform, Brandeis devoted his life to social justice. He defended the right of every citizen to speak freely, and his groundbreaking conception of the right to privacy continues to impact legal thoughts today."

Brandeis died in Washington, D.C., in 1941.

He was the first of eight Jews to have served on the U.S. Supreme Court, including Benjamin Cardozo, Felix Frankfurter, Arthur Goldberg, Abe Fortas, Ruth Bader Ginsberg, and Stephen Breyer. Elena Kagan, the most recent of the group, has served as an associate justice since 2010.

Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow



Relax. Close your eyes and visualize yourself boarding a plane flying to somewhere in the world that is beautiful, interesting, welcoming and holds much meaning for you. What country is all of those things plus much more? Is it England you ask, or Australia, or a tropical island? Not really. It's the Temple Beth El Israel Library flying you all the way to Israel! Yes, we

have many books about Israel, but this year I'll be reviewing two books - one emphasizing the places you will be able to visit, and the other emphasizing the people who live there. This month, I will be reviewing the former -a book that deals with the places you can see.

The book's name is simple. It's called Israel, and in it are many beautiful photographs. Those of you who have been to Israel will recognize many sites you have visited, but will also view places that may not be so familiar. Those of you who have never been to Israel will appreciate this book's assortment of places. Don't forget, Israel is a country of variety even though it is a small dot on the map. The Introduction to the book states that we find "snow-capped mountains, fertile valleys, arid and desolate regions of desert, sparkling lakes and seaside resorts are all to be found within the boundaries of Israel. The hustle and bustle of towns, noisy local markets, the sanctity of the holy places and a close association with the Bible all wait to be experienced by travellers of all ages and interests from all walks of life."

Specifically, this book gives you pictures of the places, plus a brief explanation of the area's history and other related information which you might find relevant. Some places in the book which tend to be familiar with many people are: Jerusalem (east and west), Dome of the Rock, Bethlehem, Hebron, Jericho, Masada, the Dead Sea,, Tel-Aviv and Jaffa, Haifa, Safed, Tiberias, Eilat and Sodom. Places that you might not have heard of include: Herodium (a fort built in the desert in 37 BCE by Herod. There is an interesting formation there which looks like a volcano, and it includes one of the earliest synagogues ever found as well as a huge palace), Ein Feshka (the natural freshwater pools), Ein Gedi (near the Dead Sea, it contains springs, waterfalls and lush tropical vegetation. Stay at the guest house of Kibbutz Ein Gedi), The Jezreel Valley - absolutely beautiful, it is the largest valley in Israel . It was a swamp until Jewish settlers made it green and fertile), Hamat Gader (known for its springs, it offers bathing pools filled with hot water from the springs. It is also where alligators imported from Florida live among the trees and tall grasses), Mount Hermon (for those who enjoy skiing, it is the highest spot in Israel. full of snow in the winter), and Beit Shean (contains 18 layers of cities, now unearthed), plus others. To stress the diversity of Israel, the last four pages deal with its variety of cultures and the assortment of flowers that appear throughout the country, contributing to its beauty.

Israel is put together as if you are going on tour - what you should see is certainly backed up with useful information and groups of photos that tease you to visit. There are many layers of Israel's history to be seen - from Biblical times until the modern period. Israel is home to a rainbow of cultures and traditions, and a wide variety of climates and landscapes. Israel awaits!

PS- I want all of you to know that I wrote this article before the vicious attack on Israel. I thought about not submitting it now, and perhaps using it at a future time. I realize nerves are quite raw right now (in October), and there is an overload of news constantly bombarding us. But after thinking about this, I feel that showing the beauty of our homeland and seeing what it offers (and will offer) may somewhat soothe many broken hearts. Yes, we will travel to Israel. The Land is too precious for us to stop visiting - it's just that we have to wait awhile to come to its shores and traverse the land. Yes, Israel still awaits!

I am ending with a quote I just read, written by Anne Frank in her diary. She wrote: "I still believe, in spite of everything, that people are truly good at heart." She wrote this after going through a time of horror, yet she still held on to hope. We need to remember this as we all, each in our own way, try to comprehend what is happening.

They face unexpected anti-Semitism. Victory for Israel comes on the playing field, even if not on the podium. This follows the 2018 hit film Heading Home.



Quarter Auction

We have had many requests to explain a "Quarter Auction" so here is an explanation:

A **quarter auction** is a fundraising event that combines elements of a raffle, an auction, and a direct sales party. It's a fun way to raise money for a good cause while enjoying some friendly competition and socializing with others. Here's how it works:

Arrival: When you arrive at the event, you'll be given a numbered paddle for a donation. This paddle will have a corresponding numbered chip that will be placed into a drawing basket.

Preview: Before the auction begins, you'll have the opportunity to browse the items up for "auction." These items will be on display for about an hour after the doors open, allowing you to decide which ones you're interested in.

Bidding: Once the auction starts, an announcer or helper will hold up an item and announce whether it's a "one-quarter" or "two-quarter" bid. If you're interested in bidding, you'll put one or two quarters (depending on what was announced) into the bucket for each paddle you wish to bid with. For example, if you have two paddles and want to bid with both of them to increase your chances of winning, and the item is a "one-quarter" bid, you'll put \$0.50 in the bucket and raise your paddles. If you decide to bid with only one paddle, you'll pay \$0.25.

Collection: A worker will walk from table to table with a bucket to collect bids. Once all the quarters have been collected, the bucket is shaken to mix up all the chips.

Winner Selection: The announcer will draw a number from the bucket, and if they draw your number and you had bid on the item, congratulations! You've won that item at a great price. If they draw your number and you didn't bid on the item, simply call out "no bid!" and they'll continue drawing numbers until they find a winner.

Additional Activities: Quarter auctions may also include various raffles and cash-and-carry items throughout the evening.

Remember to bring quarters with you to the event; however, if you forget or run out, there will be rolls of quarters available for purchase. Enjoy the excitement of bidding on items while supporting a good cause!


