MST860 Speaks by Debbie Brateman

TBEI adopted MST860, a Czech Torah Holocaust survivor, into our family on 15 April 2023. Though MST860 was a survivor, her Czech congregation was not. This column is dedicated to MST860 and what this Torah can teach

My Soul Speaks... Will You Listen?

is for MEMORIES. That is all that is left to me of my congregation from Bohemia/Moravia. I was a central part of their worship, their education, their paths in life. We celebrated together, we mourned together. There is nothing left of them now, but they are a part of me. And as long as I exist, they will exist, because they are part of me and I will always remember them.

is for SURVIVAL. I am a survivor of the hate that was the Holocaust. And I am triumphant because that hate did not destroy me. I am here at Temple Beth El Israel with my new family. Together we will write new stories, create new memories, that will come from a community of respect and understanding and acceptance.

is for TEACHING. I am a Torah, and my job is to teach. I am here to guide the choices we make, so that we always seek justice. This must be taught to our children, I'dor v'dor. It must be taught to our community, our neighbors. Justice, justice shall we pursue. We cannot, we must not stand silently by when we see injustice and hate.

Now let's have some fun with the second part of my name — the numbers...

are the days before a Bris, the manifestation of our covenant with G-d. A covenant is a kind of contract between G-d and humanity, that outlines the terms or obligations on both sides. On the humanity side, there are 613 commandments that guide us to be an honest, charitable and respectful people — a moral people, whose main job is TIKKUN OLAM — to repair our world. This implies ACTIVE PARTICIPATION — to perform mitzvot (good deeds), big or small, that leave our world, or our part of the world, better because we were in it.

are the books of the Mishnah, sometimes called the Oral Torah, that accompanies and clarifies the Written Torah — me. One rabbinic legend asserts that G-d dictated the Torah to Moses by day and explained it to him by night. This explanation is the Mishnah. Think of it as the Court, deciding on cases by interpreting the intent of the Constitution. The ruling is given with an explanation. And any dissenting decision is also pub lished with an explanation. In this parable, the Court and its rulings are the Mishnah, and the Constitution is the Torah — me.

is what is left of my Jewish Czech community. They were annihilated, wiped off the face of the earth only because they were Jewish. This cannot ever happen again. This must not ever happen again. NEVER AGAIN!

Let's have some more fun with the numbers in my name. It is said that a whole is the sum of its parts. So let's add up my "parts." 8+6+0=14 and 1+4=5 Amazing! Five are the books of the Torah, and that's me! I am the sum of my "parts!".

THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ By Ellis Bromberg Stamp Of the Month: A LASTING PEACE IN THE MIDDLE EAST HOPED FOR... 31 YEARS AGO

On September 13, 1993 -- 31 years ago this month -- Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) Chairman Yasser Arafat met in Washington, D.C., to sign a Declaration of Principles on Interim Self-Government Arrangements, commonly referred to as the Oslo Accord. The two were hosted at the White House by U.S. President Bill Clinton, who had facilitated the negotiations. An iconic photo of the handshake between Rabin and Arafat was recreated on this month's featured multicolored stamp issued by the Marshall Islands in 2000.



In the Oslo Accord, Israel accepted the PLO as the representative of the Palestinians, while the PLO renounced terrorism and recognized Israel's right to exist in peace. Both sides agreed that a Palestinian Authority (PA) would be established and assume governing responsibilities in the West Bank and Gaza Strip over a five-year period. Then, the sides agreed, permanent status talks on the issues of borders, refugees, and Jerusalem would be held.

While the Clinton administration played a limited role in bringing the two sides to the table -- it did not initially make Israeli-Palestinian peace a priority -- it did invest vast amounts of time and resources in order to help the two sides implement the agreement. But since the Ac-

cord did not give the United States monitoring responsibilities, the Clinton administration found itself largely confined to defusing crises and building up the PA with economic aid and security assistance.

In November 1995, Rabin was assassinated by Yigal Amir, an Israeli who opposed the Oslo Accord on religious grounds. Rabin's murder was followed by a string of attacks by Hamas, the Palestinian terrorist group, that undermined support for Rabin's Labor Party in Israel's May 1996 elections. The new prime minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, leader of the Likud Party, had historically opposed Palestinian statehood.

Worried that the peace process might collapse, the Clinton administration increased its involvement in Israeli-Palestinian negotiations. In January 1997, following intensive U.S. mediation, Israel and the PA signed the Hebron Protocol which provided for the transfer of most of Hebron, a city in the southern West Bank, to Palestinian control. In October 1998, Clinton hosted Netanyahu and Arafat at the Wye River Plantation in Maryland, where they negotiated an agreement calling for further Israeli withdrawals from the West Bank. Infighting over the implementation of the Wye Memorandum, however, brought down Netanyahu's government in January 1999.

The Labor Party's Ehud Barak, who replaced Netanyahu, signed the Sharm El Sheikh Memorandum with Arafat in September 1999; it committed both sides to begin permanent status negotiations. An initial round of meetings, however, achieved nothing, and in December, the Palestinians suspended talks over settlement building in the occupied territories.

In July 2000, at Barak's insistence, Clinton convened a summit at Camp David, the U.S. presidential retreat in Maryland, where Barak and Arafat attempted to reach a final agreement on the West Bank and Gaza Strip. Accounts differ as to why Camp David failed, but it is clear that despite additional concessions by Barak, the Israelis and Palestinians remained strongly at odds over borders, Jerusalem, and whether Israel would recognize Palestinian refugees' "right of return" to present-day Israel. The summit ended without a settlement; Clinton blamed Arafat for its failure.

In December 2000, Clinton put forward his own proposals for an Israeli-Palestinian agreement. By that point, however, the president was leaving office, Barak faced electoral defeat, and a wave of Israeli-Palestinian violence that began at the Temple Mount in the Old City of Jerusalem, known as the Al-Aqsa Intifada, had erupted.

By the time Clinton left office, in January 2001, the Oslo peace process had run aground, and the prospect of ending the Israeli-Palestinian conflict looked more distant than it had been eight years earlier. It remains elusive to this day.

The Marshall Islands issue, captioned "A lasting peace in Middle East promised," is one of a 15-stamp souvenir sheet that features newsworthy events of the 1990's, termed a "decade of globalization and hope."

Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow




Rosh Hashanah will arrive in a month, but because the October Shofar will be printed too close to it, I decided to put the holiday article in the September Shofar in case you want to use the recipe in your planning. I am using a book in our library that I have reviewed before - I believe for Passover recipes. But I found something for Rosh Hashanah you might like. It appears in the book The Book of Jewish Cooking by Gil Marks, and it includes so many interesting recipes from many countries where Jews live or have lived. It contains an informative Introduction you should read, and a background page with information about Ashkenazim and Sephardim.

I wanted something "a little different" to offer you for the New Year, and this is on page 308. Its name is "Lekach - Ashkenazic Honey Cake", and it is one ingredient that makes it more unique than your everyday honey cake. What is it? Alcohol! I must say that I have eaten a variety of honey cakes through the years, but none included alcohol. If you are daring enough to bake it, let me know what you think of it and I will pass on the word to all of our readers. I have baked rum cakes in the past for January 1st - and they were delicious (or so my guests said). I think this honey cake will measure up to them! Now for the recipe:


ASHKENAZIC HONEY CAKE

- 3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour (or 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour and 1 cup whole wheat flour)
- 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice, cardamon, or ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 1/4 cups granulated sugar or brown sugar
- 1 1/3 cups honey
- 1 cup strong hot brewed coffee or tea
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons whiskey, brandy, or thawed orange juice concentrate or apple juice concentrate
- 1 tablespoon grated orange zest (optional)
- 1 to 1 1/2 cups raisins or chopped pitted dates, or 3/4 cup each (optional)

Blanched whole almonds for garnish(optional)



inch baking pan with waxed paper or aluminum foil, grease, and dust with flour.



- 3. Beat the eggs and sugar until light and fluffy. Add the honey mixture alternately in 3 parts with the flour mixture, starting and ending with the flour mixture. If desired, stir in the raisins and dates.
- 4. Pour into the prepared pans. If desired, arrange the almonds in a pattern over the surface.
- 5. Bake until a tester inserted in the center comes out clean, about 1 hour for the loaf pans, 35 minutes for the 9-inch-square pans, or 1 1/4 hours for the large pan. (If the cake looks like it is starting to burn before it is done, cover loosely with foil.) Let cool in the pans on a wire rack. Invert and remove the paper or foil. Wrap and store at room temperature or in the freezer. (It keeps well and is even better after standing for a day).

Variations - For a more intense honey flavor, increase the amount of honey to 2 cups. Reduce the amount of brown sugar to 1 cup and the coffee to 1/2 cup.

For an apple- honey cake, add 3 cups (about 1 pound) peeled, cored, and grated apples.

For a carrot-honey cake, add 4 cups (about 1 1/3 pounds) finely grated carrots.


This book first gives us the interesting background to "Lekach" or honey cake - first baked on Shavuot, Purim, Hanukkah. and even a Passover matzah version. I appreciate the way this book offers the reader so much information about most recipes included within its pages. It also supplies us with variations to the given recipes, including this one.

At this time, or any other time, if you check this book out from our library, look through its pages so you can view the many other delicious recipes you might want to try. For Rosh Hashanah, other recipes that appear in this book are: Ashkenazic Honey Balls, Bombay Fish Fillets in Romaine, Chicken Polo, Italian Sweet and Sour Fish, and Sephardic Roasted Lamb Shoulder. Added to the recipes are sketches and interesting photographs.

Other authors have made excellent comments about this book. Faye Levy has written: "The World of Jewish Cooking makes delectable reading. Each recipe comes with a fascinating history evoking the role of the dish in Jewish life at a particular time or place, There's a wealth of enticing dishes...." 
