Happy Thanksgiving



The High Holidays are over. The festivals are behind us as we now move into our year. A couple of dates to put in your calendars:

Friday November 9th: KRISTALLNACHT will be commemorated at our service. The night, considered by many to be the beginning of the Holocaust of World War II happened November 9/10, 1938.

As antisemitism grows in our country through vitriolic language and antisemitic crimes increase and the percentage of hate crimes listed by the FBI that fit this description reaches 68%, it is time for us to begin to look more seriously at the landscape around our country based on the language and words used in public discourse.

It appears to be time for us to remember the clarion call of past generations not so many decades ago: NEVER AGAIN. It is time for us to remember that when societies carve out the "others" it quickly becomes all of the others, not just the ones being name called - they are just the ones to be impacted first. I am not suggesting that we become overly fearful but that we become more watchful and perhaps, a bit less wishful. Let's choose watchfulness over fear but let us not become this generation's denialists. At its root, hate unleashed on one group ultimately opens the doors to hate unleashed against many "subcutaneous" groups within a society. Everything wrong with a society becomes the fault of the "others" - 68% of hate crimes in America are aimed at the Jewish community - 2 out of every 3....

Let us bond together as a Jewish community as we are strengthened by our numbers. The more of us they know about, the stronger we appear and that helps us in many ways.

We also celebrate Thanksgiving this month. Let us make this a year when we look deeply at the prayers in our siddha (prayerbook) and recognize how many of our prayers are alluding to the concept of giving thanks... Let's focus on that and be watchful as we also remember NEVER AGAIN holds us to a higher standard of watching out for each other, Jewish or not.

We were chosen by God in the Torah and instructed over 30 times to watch over, and be protective of, the GER TOSHAV - the resident alien, for the most part people trying to make a better life for themselves. Fear mongering is telling us they're almost all criminals BUT most of the inmates I see when I visit local, and state jails are white-skinned Americans. Let us create the way to tell the difference between the vast majority of immigrants who, like us a generation ago, are God fearing, honest people trying to better their lives from the few who are inherently troubled human beings.

We are God's chosen. It is our job to NOT be a stumbling block for the GER TOSHAV - certainly not unreasonably due to peddlers of fear. The Jewish way is to do to them as you would want it to be done to us. 68% - a daunting number requiring our focus and diligence. Let the bookends this month of Kristallnacht and Thanksgiving teach us much about how to live as God's chosen. It is our job.

As we head into this new year together, I want to let you know some of the amazing things we have accomplished, some you can see and some you can't. And thank you Michael & Kay for everything else that you have done whether it's security or taking care of our building, especially getting us ready for the Holidays. Thank you, Richard Levine, for your beautiful services; and stepping up whenever Rabbi Benson is unavailable to conduct a service, not to mention being our Shofarist this year. And thank you to Nadine Wenzel for your very generous donation to enable us to beautify our Bemah.

Thank you to Sisterhood for providing the Onegs we enjoy on Fridays, and to everyone who sponsors an Oneg for special occasions. Our thanks to Brotherhood for your help during the Holiday services. And thank you to everyone that has stepped up to be a part of our Holiday services.

Our volunteers are the backbone of this Temple. I want to take this opportunity to express my deepest appreciation to everyone that gives their time and help in all the areas that require volunteers. Their caring and devotion has been essential in our ability to not only survive the challenges of the last few years, but we have come out stronger than ever. This is exactly what our Temple family is all about.

I also want to thank every member of our Board past and present for their time and commitment to our congregation. Their dedication ensures that our values are supported.

My last special thank you goes to Rabbi Benson for all he continues to do to make TBEI the very exceptional and extraordinary Temple that we are. For the unique High Holy Day services he conducts and for our choir that we have come to look forward to every year. Just so you know, the coordination between Rabbi and the choir doesn't happen when they walk through our doors Erev Rosh Hashanah – they spend a lot of time together during the months prior to the Holidays rehearsing, in order for our services to come together the way they do.



Dear Brotherhood Members,



THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ By Ellis Bromberg Stamp Of the Month: EL AL NATIONAL AIRLINES INCORPORATED 76 YEAR AGO THIS MONTH



A mere vision in 1948, the year when it was incorporated, El Al Israel Airlines today is one of the world's most advanced and efficient airlines and the ultimate success story of international civil aviation. This month's featured stamp, a multicolored souvenir sheet, was issued by Israel in 1962 during the El Al Stamp Show in Tel Aviv, held to celebrate the airline's early years.

The birth and growth of El Al is directly tied to the dramatic and historic establishment of Israel as an independent state on May 14, 1948, which paved the way for El Al to become Israel's national airline. In September 1948, the Israeli government wanted to bring home its newly designated president, Chaim Weizmann, and his

wife Vera, from Switzerland. Officials chose a four-engine C-54 from the Israeli Air Force and named the aircraft "El Al," inspired by the biblical phrase from the book of the Hebrew prophet Hosea, meaning "to the above," or more poetically "to the skies." Hurriedly, the plane was painted with the name "El Al" and "Israel National Aviation Company" in both English and Hebrew, with the Israeli flag on the tail. After the ten-hour flight from Geneva, on September 28, the aircraft landed with President Chaim and Vera Weizmann at Ekron Airbase near Rehovot, southeast of Tel Aviv, to a military band playing "Hatikvah," the national anthem of the new nation.

On November 15, 1948 -- 76 years ago this month -- the new Israeli airline became incorporated under the name El Al Israel Airlines Ltd. with the Israeli government holding 80% and the remaining 20% held by Jewish organizations in Israel. Its original goal was to provide a better means of transportation for Jewish immigrants. At first the flights were manned by volunteers and the aircraft originated from World War II surplus (DC-4 Skymasters and C-46 Curtis Commandos). El Al played a decisive role in saving the imperilled Jewish communities of the Middle East.

But El Al was quick to branch out, adding flights to Paris and Rome in 1949. In 1950, the company acquired Constellations and the routes covered included Athens, Zurich, Vienna, London, Nairobi, Johannesburg, and New York. Istanbul, Brussels, Amsterdam, Frankfort, Munich, Copenhagen and Tehran were added soon thereafter. By the beginning of the 21st century, there were 50 international destinations, including Beijing and New Delhi, as well as nine cities in the United States.

El Al has been a repeated target for terrorist attacks; fortunately most of these were foiled thanks to excellent security. However, despite all the precautions taken, a passenger was killed in Athens in 1968, and a crew member lost his life in Zurich in 1969.

El Al played a crucial role in the 1990's, bringing a steady flow of immigrants from Russia and Ethiopia. The company also played a crucial role during the 1991 Gulf War, remaining the sole active airline, as all other companies suspended their flights to Israel.

The 55 prutot stamp at the center of the souvenir sheet features an El Al 707 Boeing Jet Airliner. El Al's original logo is displayed in the upper left hand corner of the souvenir sheet.



Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow




Names. We all have them, given to us soon after birth. Some of us like them, others don't. Some of us decide to be called by a nickname instead. but no matter, we have them for life - and it's nice to know that the name itself is filled with some sort of meaning, and it's nice to know what that meaning is. The book I

am reviewing, The New Name Dictionary (Modern English and Hebrew Names) by Alfred

J. Kolatch, is full of many of the first names that exist, plus more information you may find interesting about where our names originated and the naming process. The author decided to follow a naming system that had been used for centuries by Jewish communities around the world. That system involved choosing for each child a Hebrew name that would correspond in meaning to his or her English name. Also, he used three surveys in the 1940's, when the purpose was to

determine which Hebrew and English names were most commonly used by Jewish children and what type of correlation existed between the two. Actually, 15,000 names were submitted, and it was concluded that there was not much of a relationship in meaning that existed between the two. Other research was conducted in 1985, telephone books in Israel were scanned for first names - and newer names were found. Even more sources were used to gather names - no simple feat! The book also includes the most popular Yiddish names, transliterated into English. Also included is a list of unisex Hebrew names.



Before I give you specific examples, let's see what the author includes in his General Introduction. There are Biblical names and their roots, Christian names - before and

after the Reformation, and also those of Puritan extremists, the return of Biblical names, Names for places, calendar and holiday names(for Christians and Jews), numeral names, name changes (as Abraham from Abram, or Sarah from Sarai), more modern names "borrowed" from the opposite sex (Alexandra from Alexander and Davida from David), names where letters have been dropped or added to form new ones (Sarah and Hannah have become Sara and Hanna, and Deborah has become Debra).

When discussing the naming process, Rabbi Kolatch writes about Jews living in the Arab world. He mentions that today, around the world, one gives a Hebrew (or Yiddish) and a secular name. However, the association between the two is usually a similarity in sound, usually confined to the first letter or syllable. The author discusses naming children after

relatives. Many of you know that Ashkenazic Jews name children after those that are no longer alive. Why? One reason given for not naming a child after a living relative was they weren't only given the name of the departed, but also along with it goes the relative's soul - and two people cannot share one soul. Another reason given was that if one names a child

after a living relative, it might result in the shortening of the older relative's life. The author even discusses in what circumstances a child could be named after non-relatives.

Of course, the author's book also contains information on when and where a boy is named, as well as when and where a girl is named. What about the naming of an adopted child? It depends on whether or not the child had already been named. How does a convert receive his or her name? Most of the time, converts use names from Abraham and Sarah. Explanations abound in the book. What if a child's father has converted to another religion? How is a child born out of wedlock named? Lastly, Rabbi Kolatch explains the naming

ceremony for both boys and girls - when it takes place and what is done within it.

The last part of the book, which is really the bulk of the book, contains names - masculine and feminine, in Hebrew and in English. But then there are also unisex Hebrew names and popular Hebrew names and popular Yiddish names. In one of the indexes, there is even a list of transliterated Hebrew names, with many page numbers listed next to each one, informing us on what other pages we can find even more information.

Many Jews know about their English names as well as their Hebrew ones. For those that might not, let me close my eyes, let my fingers wander the pages of the TBEI Directory. Where it stops is the name I will describe. (eyes closed to be fair. I don't want to be blamed for being partial)! Here are the results:

Ferne - from the Anglo-Saxon, meaning "strong and brave"

Linda - from the Latin and Spanish meaning "handsome, pretty" or from the Anglo-Saxon, meaning "lovely or gentle maid" Leonard - French form of the Old High German meaning "strong as a lion"

Debra - a variant form of Deborah - from the Hebrew meaning "swarm of bees" or "to speak kind words"

Faith - from the Anglo-Saxon meaning "unswerving trust and hope"


William - a variant from Old French Willaume and the Old High German Willehelm meaning "resolute protector"

Hebrew equivalents are given next to each name.

This is not a book only for new parents. It might be interesting for you to look up the names of other relatives and friends. It would be a fascinating discussion around a holiday dinner table, or out with friends!

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
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Quarter Auction

Quarter Auction

We have had many requests to explain a "Quarter Auction" so here is an explanation:

A **quarter auction** is a fundraising event that combines elements of a raffle, an auction, and a direct sales party. It's a fun way to raise money for a good cause while enjoying some friendly competition and socializing with others. Here's how it works:

Arrival: When you arrive at the event, you'll be given a numbered paddle for a donation. This paddle will have a corresponding numbered chip that will be placed into a drawing basket.

Preview: Before the auction begins, you'll have the opportunity to browse the items up for "auction." These items will be on display for about an hour after the doors open, allowing you to decide which ones you're interested in.

Bidding: Once the auction starts, an announcer or helper will hold up an item and announce whether it's a "one-quarter" or "two-quarter" bid. If you're interested in bidding, you'll put one or two quarters (depending on what was announced) into the bucket for each paddle you wish to bid with. For example, if you have two paddles and want to bid with both of them to increase your chances of winning, and the item is a "one-quarter" bid, you'll put \$0.50 in the bucket and raise your paddles. If you decide to bid with only one paddle, you'll pay \$0.25.

Collection: A worker will walk from table to table with a bucket to collect bids. Once all the quarters have been collected, the bucket is shaken to mix up all the chips.

Winner Selection: The announcer will draw a number from the bucket, and if they draw your number and you had bid on the item, congratulations! You've won that item at a great price. If they draw your number and you didn't bid on the item, simply call out "no bid!" and they'll continue drawing numbers until they find a winner.

Additional Activities: Quarter auctions may also include various raffles and cash-and-carry items throughout the evening.

Remember to bring quarters with you to the event; however, if you forget or run out, there will be rolls of quarters available for purchase. Enjoy the excitement of bidding on items while supporting a good cause!
