From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson



As you get this, the High Holidays will be at the cusp of starting. Throughout the month of Elul, we have begun learning about how to look at ourselves through the lens of self-reflection. The act of contrition is hard to create internally, but every year, that is our attempt. Why is it that we don't fully learn the skill set that we have worked on for decades even as our lives have been successful in so many other areas?

Is it related to the idea that, if we complete our task, we are then obligated to live with those imagined walls surrounding us and we really,

truly don't want that? Is it that we think we don't really have the need to change who we are now? Perhaps we have no sense of vision of ourselves for the future.

Maybe what we lack is the vision to honestly look at our lives in the way that God asks of us. To look deeply into our spirit, call it a should if you choose, but learning the truthful skill of seeing that we, as a living work of art, aren't perfect. That there is much to like or love about us, but conversely, that there is much we can adjust (or fix-even with a little tug or nudge).

Several years ago, I asked each of you here to create a "fix-it list" to work on during the Yamim noraim-(the days of awe), the 10 days that require deep self reflection to achieve. A skill far too few of us understand when we imagine what it takes to succeed at it. Quite often, we trick ourselves into thinking we have success when we've really only lightly touched the surface.

This year, as we enter into the holiday season, outmode of prayer will be different than ever before. The Hebrew will stay the same. It is the English that will allow us to consider our worship in different light. This year, during the services, we will be asked to read and consider some texts, sometimes in silence, offering ourselves intense self-reflection. Some things will be presented slightly differently than ever before. Consider it exciting that this year we can spread our wings as eagles do, and allow our spirits to soar in a way never before achieved. This year, we'll talk about the how, the why and unequivocally ask ourselves, "what will it take this year to succeed"?





THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ By Ellis Bromberg

Stamp Of the Month: RABBI AMNON OF MAINZ AND UNETANEH TOKEF

The *piyyut* (liturgical poem) that begins with the words *Unetaneh tokef* is a highlight of the High Holy Days liturgy. This year we will recite the poem during Rosh Hashanah, beginning the evening of Wednesday, October 2, and on Yom Kippur, beginning Friday evening, October 11.



The words of the poem express the essence of the holidays and reflect the thought that, on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we stand before God, who reviews our deeds and determines our fate for the upcoming year: "Let us proclaim the sacred power of this day; it is awesome and full of dread.... You remember deeds long forgotten. You open the book of our days.... As the shepherd seeks out his flock, and makes the sheep pass under his staff, so do You muster and number and consider every soul, setting the bounds of every creature's life, and decreeing its destiny.... who shall see ripe age and who shall not."

On one hand, the poem features phrases that emphasize the fragility of human existence, and the nothingness of man as compared to the omnipotence of God: "Man's origin is dust and dust is his end. Each of us is a shattered urn, grass that must wither, a flower that will fade...a

particle of dust floating on the wind, a dream soon forgotten." On the other hand, the poem offers believers a way to atone for their actions and to affect their disposition: "But repentance, prayer and charity temper judgement's severe decree."

The poem is quite ancient, composed in Israel during the Byzantine period. The earliest surviving written version was discovered in the Cairo Geniza, a collection of Jewish manuscript fragments kept in the storeroom (*geniza*) of the Ben Ezra Synagogue in Old Cairo.


But tradition attributes the poem to the 11th century Rabbi Amnon of Mayence (Mainz in today's Germany), who according to legend nearly lost his faith when he failed to reject outright an offer from the local bishop to convert to Christianity. He recanted and reiterated his devotion to Judaism, leading to severe punishment: that same bishop ordered his hands and feet to be cut off. The dying Rabbi Amnon was taken to the synagogue where he wrote the famous poem in his final moments, and that is the event depicted on this month's featured multicolored 5 shekel stamp, issued by Israel in 2023. The red letters above the torahs read, in Hebrew, *Unetaneh tokef*, while the tab, the label below the stamp, incorporates the quotation, in Hebrew, that reflects the meaning of the Day of Atonement: "Who shall live and who shall die."

Unetaneh tokef has become widely known in Israel in recent years because of a new melody composed by Yair Rosenblum in 1990. The tune was written for the people of Kibbutz Beit Hashita, which lost 11 members in the Yom Kippur War. But it spread throughout the country and is now featured widely in memorials to all those who fell in that conflict.

Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow

While searching through Amazon, I noticed there are just not that many books solely about Yom Kippur. It was interesting to see numerous books on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur together in one volume, but little on JUST Yom Kippur. Our temple

library, however, does contain one book about ONLY Yom Kippur, and it is one with a 5-star rating. Its title is *The Yom Kippur Anthology*, by Philip Goodman, and there is so much information related to Yom Kippur in it, I am sure it will supply you with a generous amount of data about this upcoming holiday which our bible calls "Shabbat Shabbaton" - the Sabbath of Sabbaths. Even before the exact date of Yom Kippur, there is a long period of self-examination and atonement. It is a month of spiritual preparation. Let's use this book for ourselves for the holiest day of the year.


The Yom Kippur Anthology

The 18 sections in The Yom Kippur Anthology provide resource materials for many individuals such as teachers, rabbis, students, parents, newcomers to Judaism and just about anyone else who would enjoy viewing knowledge of all types with which you might not be familiar. I recommend you read the Introduction for background information.

The first five sections show you traditional texts for study and historical relationships. We look at Yom Kippur in the Bible, in political writings, in the Talmud and Midrash, in Medieval Jewish Literature and in Jewish law. The next two sections "provide valuable source material to enhance one's appreciation and understanding of the High Holiday prayer book. " We read classic Yom Kippur prayers, with commentaries, which will certainly move the reader. We will find a section about the music of the Yom Kippur liturgy -with notes and related information. You will also find a section on Hasidic tales and teachings. Another section I know you will enjoy is "Yom Kippur In Modern Prose" which contains essays some of which are: "Every Day is a Day of Atonement", "Why Do You Fast on Yom Kippur", "Community Confession", "The Jewish Idea of Atonement", and "The Revelation of *Neilah" - *to name only a few. The section "Yom Kippur in Art" provides us with examples of meaningful pieces of art related, of course, to Yom Kippur. In the section "Yom Kippur in Many Lands", we visit numerous places throughout different times, starting in Temple days. We then visit Yom Kippur and the Marranos, the Falashas, the Bene-Israel, the Jews of Libya, the Persian Jews, an Eastern European town, in Russia, in Frankfurt, in the London Ghetto, in Old San Francisco, in Japan, in the Warsaw Ghetto, in the Dachau concentration camp, in Korea, at the Vietnam Front, and in Moscow. How wonderful it is to visit places around the world as it relates to Yom Kippur. For those of you who enjoy poetry, this book has a section of just that - "Yom Kippur in Poetry". It contains over twenty pages of fourteen Yom Kippur poems. Next is a section of short stories written by writers such as Elie Wiesel and Sholom Aleichem. We read about a prayerbook which beckoned to a boy, leading to his learning about the meaning of life and wisdom. Another story concerns a man who goes to a Yom Kippur service in a synagogue with his money that he was too afraid to leave at the inn where he was staying. And what happened? It was stolen! Unheard of! After closing the doors, the rabbi insisted there be an investigation. All persons turned their pockets inside out, one-by-one except for one man. Sholem Aleichem tells this story with what one might consider - an unexpected ending, Next, there is an interesting section titled "Yom Kippur Miscellany" which includes interesting information such as: other names for Yom Kippur, parallels in Islam, Yom Kippur likened to a wedding day, importance of the number ten, a Yom Kippur blood libel in New York - to name only a few. So that children are included as part of this book, it has included two sections for them. One is "Children's Stories For Yom Kippur" which also includes recommended age levels, but adults may also enjoy reading them. The other children's section, "Children's Poems For Yom Kippur", contains six poems which are a joy to read. *The Yom Kippur Anthology* also includes a list of illustrations in The Table of Contents - not numerous, but enough to spark your interest.

If you thought you knew a lot about Yom Kippur, looking at this book will show you there is always more to learn and appreciate. The month of self-examination and atonement when you spiritually prepare during the month of Elul and ending with Yom Kippur, will certainly give you a different and more expansive look at the holiday with this book in hand. You approach Yom Kippur with more than just facts. Instead, you now have many tools which help to add more meaning to the holiday - tools such as: Jewish literature of Medieval times, Jewish law, prayers, music, Hasidic teachings, modern prose, short stories and art. Lastly, you will familiarize yourself with knowledge about Yom Kippur in many other lands. How fortunate we are to have *The Yom Kippur Anthology* in our library!

Quarter Auction

We have had many requests to explain a "Quarter Auction" so here is an explanation:

A **quarter auction** is a fundraising event that combines elements of a raffle, an auction, and a direct sales party. It's a fun way to raise money for a good cause while enjoying some friendly competition and socializing with others. Here's how it works:

Arrival: When you arrive at the event, you'll be given a numbered paddle for a donation. This paddle will have a corresponding numbered chip that will be placed into a drawing basket.

Preview: Before the auction begins, you'll have the opportunity to browse the items up for "auction." These items will be on display for about an hour after the doors open, allowing you to decide which ones you're interested in.

Bidding: Once the auction starts, an announcer or helper will hold up an item and announce whether it's a "one-quarter" or "two-quarter" bid. If you're interested in bidding, you'll put one or two quarters (depending on what was announced) into the bucket for each paddle you wish to bid with. For example, if you have two paddles and want to bid with both of them to increase your chances of winning, and the item is a "one-quarter" bid, you'll put \$0.50 in the bucket and raise your paddles. If you decide to bid with only one paddle, you'll pay \$0.25.

Collection: A worker will walk from table to table with a bucket to collect bids. Once all the quarters have been collected, the bucket is shaken to mix up all the chips.

Winner Selection: The announcer will draw a number from the bucket, and if they draw your number and you had bid on the item, congratulations! You've won that item at a great price. If they draw your number and you didn't bid on the item, simply call out "no bid!" and they'll continue drawing numbers until they find a winner.

Additional Activities: Quarter auctions may also include various raffles and cash-and-carry items throughout the evening.

Remember to bring quarters with you to the event; however, if you forget or run out, there will be rolls of quarters available for purchase. Enjoy the excitement of bidding on items while supporting a good cause!



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


