

From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson

Leviticus has begun. We're taking a "break" from the story of the Exodus to insert laws, ordinances and directives from God to the Israelites. We're learning how to become a people with those things and morethe beginnings of governmental structure, authority lines and more. We are becoming a people with defined responsibility to each other and to this nascent society as a whole. After Leviticus concludes, we come back to the story of the Exodus and the journey continues until we end the yearly cycle of Torah at the end of Deuteronomy.



The portion tells us of the importance of supporting community and it's entities by tithing. It asks a half shekel from each member of the society to support the tabernacle, the priests and Levites. In effect, the community is responsible for financially supporting the defined structure of the religious hierarchy. It was also a way to observe a census without

having to count individuals. IF you count the number of half shekel coins, you have, in effect, the number of members of the community of tithable age.

The incredible thing is that the two men, asked by Moses to design the tabernacle had to ask him to request that the people STOP bringing tithes as they had more than they were going to need. Oh do I wish I had to write that sermon for us.....

As we head into the month of Nisan, it reminds us that Pesach is coming- and quickly!!

The temple seder is scheduled for Saturday April 12. Get your reservations in to share the holiday celebration with us and your temple family.

We will also be commemorating Yom HaShoah - Holocaust memorial day during our Shabbat evening service April 18th.

Also, for those who observe yahrzeit at the 4 yizkor services during the year, it will be held at the end of Passover on Saturday the 19th during our shabbat morning service.

The festival of Passover reminds us that we must always be vigilant and watchful wherever we gather as Jews. During the history of humanity, we have been a target anytime a society becomes upended and needs a scapegoat. It is more important than ever, that we, as a community, watch over each other and the community as a whole. Bring a friend to a service, encourage them to join our community. It is in growth of numbers that we will become more safe and secure.

You can see, there's a lot coming up this month. Mark your calendars. Hopefully, we'll see you here at the temple.

In the meantime, Elijah is preparing for his yearly trek to check on the Jews. Are you ready for his visit this year?



YOM HASHOAH

More than eighty years have passed since the Nazi concentration camps were liberated and the Holocaust that claimed the six million Jewish lives came to an end. To ensure that the six million did not die in vain and that the Holocaust never happens again, Temple Beth El Israel once again will join Jews throughout the United States and around the world by participating in the **Yom Hashoah Yel-low Candle Holocaust Commemoration** to keep alive the memories of the Six Million who per-ished.

The Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle is modeled after a traditional Jewish Yahrzeit memorial candle that burns for 24 hours during periods of mourning. The wax reminds us of the yellow arm bands that Jews were forced to wear during the Nazi regime.

As the years pass, the memories of those who were victims in this ultimate hate crime must not diminish. We encourage your family to light a yellow candle on the night of Wednesday, April 23, 2025, and join as thousands of Jewish families light their Yom HaShoah candles. 

THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ By Ellis Bromberg

80 YEAR COMMEMORATION OF THE LIBERATION OF THE CONCENTRATION CAMPS

A warning: this column includes graphic and disturbing descriptions of concentration camp victims. Reader discretion is advised.



Allies liberate Holocaust survivors, early 1945

Eighty years ago this month, on April 5, 1945, units from the American Fourth Armored Division of the Third Army were the first Americans to discover a Nazi concentration camp with prisoners and corpses: Ohrdruf. The chilling scene was depicted on a 32-cent U.S. stamp titled "Allies liberate Holocaust survivors, early 1945," issued in 1995 as part of a souvenir sheet marking the 50th anniversary of World War II. The stamp designer, William Bond, used a photo taken by Margaret Bourke-White, the first American female war photojournalist, at the camp after its liberation.

Ohrdruf was a Buchenwald sub-camp located in central Germany. Of its 10,000 male slave inmates, many had been sent on death marches, shot in pits,

or their corpses stacked in the woods and burned. The Americans discovered the camp by accident -- they did not set out to liberate camps, they happened upon them -- and found starved, frail bodies of hundreds of prisoners who had managed to survive, as well as the corpses. The next week, on April 11, the American Timberwolf Division discovered another concentration camp in nearby Nordhausen, where they found 3000 corpses and 700 starving, ill, and war-wounded survivors who were slaves in the Nazis' V-2 rocket factories.

Also, on April 11, U.S. forces entered Buchenwald, near Weimar in central Germany, one of the first and largest of the Nazi concentration camps. When American Combat Team 9 of the 9th Armored Infantry Battalion, Sixth Armored Division, was led there by Russian soldiers, it contained 30,000 prisoners with German Communists in the main barracks, and Jews and Gypsies in an assortment of barns called Little Camp. Although the barrack prisoners were reasonably healthy looking, Little Camp had 1000-1200 prisoners in a space meant for 450. Witnesses described prisoners as "emaciated beyond all imagination or description. Their legs and arms were sticks with huge bulging joints, and their loins were fouled by their own excrement. Their eyes were sunk so deep that they looked blind. If they moved at all, it was with a crawling slowness that made them look like huge, lethargic spiders. Many just lay in their bunks as if dead." After liberation, hundreds of prisoners died daily.

U.S. Generals Dwight Eisenhower, Omar Bradley, and George Patton arrived in Ohrdruf on April 12. There they found 3200 naked, emaciated bodies in shallow graves. Eisenhower saw a shed piled to the ceiling with bodies, various torture devices, and a butcher's block for smashing gold fillings from the mouths of the dead. Bradley later wrote about the day: "The smell of death overwhelmed us." Patton, whose reputation for toughness was legendary, was overcome; he refused to enter a room where bodies of naked men who had starved to death were piled up, saying, according to Eisenhower, "he would get sick if he did so."


Before the month was out, on April 29, American troops liberated the main camp at Dachau, in southern Germany, where they found 28 wagons of decomposing bodies in addition to thousands of starving and dying prisoners. Three days earlier, about 7000 prisoners, most of them Jews, had been sent on a death march to Tegernsee, 53 miles away. (American forces liberated those prisoners in early May.)

Eisenhower issued an order that American units were to visit the camps. "We are told that the American soldier does not know what he was fighting for," he said. "Now at least he will know what he is fighting against." He also invited the American press to come and see the camps, and a group of prominent journalists, led by the dean of American publishers, Joseph Pulitzer, did so. Pulitzer initially had "a suspicious frame of mind," he wrote. He expected to find that many of "the terrible reports" printed in the United States were "exaggerations and largely propaganda." But they were understatements, he reported.

In a legendary broadcast on April 15, Edward R. Murrow gave the American radio audience a stunning matter-of-fact description of Buchenwald: of the piles of dead bodies so emaciated that those shot through the head had barely bled, and of those children who still lived, tattooed with numbers, whose ribs could be seen through their thin shirts. "I pray you to believe what I have said," Murrow asked listeners. "I have reported what I saw and heard, but only part of it; for most of it I have no words." He added, "If I have offended you by this rather mild account of Buchenwald, I am not in the least sorry."

U.S. Congressional delegations soon came to visit the camps, accompanied by journalists and photographers. It was their reports, the newsreel pictures that were shot and played in theaters, that proved to be influential in the public consciousness of the still unnamed Nazi atrocities and the perception that something horrific had been done to the Jews of Europe.



Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow



Many of the holidays that appear on the Jewish calendar have specific foods that we enjoy eating. Rosh Hashanah has honey cake, Chanukah has latkes and sufganiyot (jelly donuts), and Purim has hamantaschen. But Passover has a numerous variety of foods - appetizers, main dishes, des-

serts and so much more. Entire cookbooks are written which include only recipes for Passover. Thus, cooking for Passover can be as varied as the rest of the year, and it is not any harder to do.

The book I am reviewing is The Passover Gourmet by Nira Rousso. Its recipes come from many different sources around the world. Many are adaptations of the food you have previously prepared - newer ideas such as garlic matzah and sugar coated matzah from Morocco, or Tunisian fava bean soup (a sephardic dish). The author's purpose was to show that recipes from many places can be easily combined and can even "enhance" one another.

Before I share a recipe with you, I have a warning. The photographs included may inter-

est you in more recipes than you expected to use. But it would be nice to have a few more recipes for back-up in the future. Let's take a look at one of the recipes in this book. It not only tastes good, but will look beautiful on your table. Orange Chocolate Roll - Serves ten:

- 8 oz. semi sweet chocolate
- 6 eggs separated
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3 Tbs matzah meal
- 2 Tbs cocoa
- Juice and grated peel of one orange

2 cups whipping cream

4 Tbs orange liqueur such as Sabra

- Grease a 15 by 10 inch jelly roll pan and line it with wax paper.

- Melt the chocolate over a very low heat and allow it to cool for 10 minutes.
- Beat the egg whites and add sugar gradually. Beat the egg yolks and add to the chocolate.
- Add the cocoa, matzah meal, orange juice and peel and 2 Tbs of the liqueur to the chocolate.
- Fold the egg whites into the mixture.
- Spread into the jelly roll pan and bake at 325 degrees for about 20-25 minutes.
- Allow to cool in the pan for 10 minutes. Invert the cake from the pan on a clean cloth towel sprinkled with cocoa. Peel off the wax paper, cool completely for about 30 minutes.
- Whip the cream and add the remaining liqueur to the cream. Spread the whipped cream over the roll but I leave some for topping.
- Roll carefully and top with the remaining whipped cream.

There are so many wonderful recipes in this book. Here are some others, just to give you an idea of the variety of goodies it contains:

Date-Apricot Haroset, Fig and Coconut Haroset, Passover Pancakes with Strawberry Sauce, Leek-Feta Patties, Cheese Triangles, Matzah-Chicken Turnovers, Passover Pizza, Tuna Croquettes in Lemony Tomato Sauce, Light Borscht with Apples, Overnight Carrot-Apple Pudding, and Cream Cheese-Apricot Cake.






