Sharah tovah A good year



From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson

The Talmud calls it a "Ma'agal Chozer"- a Circle without end. Another year is coming to a close and another year is about to begin (5786).

So, what does it mean?

First, let's look at the differences between the secular New Year and Rosh Hashana.

First, the Torah doesn't use the phrase "Rosh Hashana - head of the year!" Here's what it does say:

In Leviticus 23:23–25, it says:

"The LORD spoke to Moses, saying: Speak to the Israelite people and say: In the seventh month, on the first day of the month, you shall observe complete rest, a sacred occasion commemorated with loud blasts. You shall not work at your occupations; and you shall bring an offering by fire to the LORD."

Here it is called Yom Teruah — a day of "sounding the shofar/blasts." In Numbers 29:1–6, it states:

"In the seventh month, on the first day of the month, you shall observe a sacred occasion: you shall not work at your occupations. It shall be a day when you sound the horn. You shall present a burnt offering of pleasing odor to the LORD..."

This passage specifies the sacrifices of the day and again calls it Yom Teruah ("Day of Sounding the Shofar").

The sounding of the shofar implies it is time to focus in on self-reflection and growth. To not try and improve our existence is to flaunt God's gifts of life, intellect and the ability to spiritually grow. To better ourselves through visualizing areas for human growth and improvement, and how to fit into our world in a better way.

During the month of Elul, (the month preceding Tishri (where the year starts on the first of Tishri-this year that's Tuesday the 23rd), it is hoped that we spend the month in preparation for the holidays and the following festivals.

This would be a great year to have a fairly short list to ask God to allow you - to grant you a pass on. Even if you can't eradicate the entire list, making the list by itself is a step towards living a better, kinder life. Who would you like to become this year? Start thinking now so that when Kol Nidre's plaintive melody is

heard, you already have a vision of the road you want to walk this year and how to bring it to a successful effort.

With all good wishes for a G'mar Chatimah Tovah - May your efforts be rewarded with a good final sealing at Yom Kippur's end and may you be not only inscribed but sealed in the Book of Life.

THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ By Ellis Bromberg Stamp Of the Month: SELICHOT IN SEPTEMBER LEADS UP TO THE HIGH HOLIDAYS

For many Jews, the High Holiday season begins with the celebration of Rosh Hashanah. Jewish tradition, however, teaches that the preceding month of Elul is a time of soul searching and reflection to prepare oneself for the magnitude of the Days of Awe. It is during that period that we cele-

brate Selichot.

In its broadest definition, *selichot* are penitential poems and prayers said before and during the High Holidays and other fast days throughout the year. While these prayers were initially only recited during the days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, the custom developed to use them in the days beforehand as well.

Different streams of Judaism mark Selichot on different days and with different practices. For instance, Sephardic and Yemenite Jews begin reciting Selichot prayers on the first day of the month of Elul, corresponding to August 25 this year, while Ashkenazim begin on the Saturday night after midnight the week before Rosh Hashanah (September 13 this year; Erev Rosh Hashanah is September 22). But whenever Selichot is celebrated, prayers and



meditations are common to all traditions, as congregants are encouraged to reflect on the past year and the changes they wish to make in the upcoming one.

The English translation of *selichot* is "forgiveness," and there is an emphasis in these prayers on the merciful attributes with which G-d is said to govern the world. In many ways, the prayers that make up the Selichot service mirror what we find on Yom Kippur soon after: the liturgy speaks of G-d's ability to forgive "transgression, iniquity, and sin." And so we begin and end the season of repentance with similar words, calling out to the compassionate G-d whom we hope will accept our prayers.

The most popular night of Selichot in the Ashkenazi tradition is the first night, when all congregants attend the late-night Saturday night service. In some communities the cantor dons a kittel (a white robe worn on special occasions) and sings elaborate melodies. In some synagogues, a choir participates in the service. Others offer a study session or screen a film about the themes of repentance and forgiveness.

In addition to the service, a meaningful ritual of changing the Torah covers to those specifically designed for the High Holidays often precedes Selichot. The special covers are usually white, representing purity and the wish that through repentance our sins will be made "white as snow" (Isaiah 1:18).

Selichot prayers are traditionally recited in the hours of darkness between midnight and dawn. Historically, synagogue officials walked around town to awaken congregants when it was time to recite the prayers, knocking on windows and calling out loudly: Get up to recite Selichot! That tradition is depicted on this month's featured stamp, a multicolored 2.40 shekel Israeli issue from 2017. The label under the stamp, known as a tab, includes two ritual objects associated with the High Holidays: a shofar and a kittel.

Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow



As the length of daylight has started to decrease and we notice it is already September, we know it is time to prepare for the High Holy Days. We accomplish this in several ways: thinking about the important meanings these High Holy days contain, looking at our prayer books for ideas, and taking

the time to appreciate what we have to do to welcome the period of time that is before us. We also, although it might seem quite trivial as compared to everything else, start to think about those items that will appear on our New Year's table - both what symbols we place on it and the food that will become a part of our menu. On this holiday, we realize we use apples and honey hoping for a sweet New Year.

You know by now that on most Rosh Hashanahs I share a recipe that contains apples or honey, or both. This year I am referring you to a cookbook I have used before mostly for Passover recipes. It is L'DOR V'DOR (from generation to generation) and the recipe I am sharing with you is:

"Spicy Chiffon Honey Cake" - pareve. I hope you enjoy it!

Ingredients

1 T. instant coffee

1 tsp baking soda

2/3 cup brewed hot coffee

6 large eggs, separated

1/2 tsp. cream of tartar

2C. flour

3/4 C. walnuts, finely ground

1/2 cup sugar

1 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. cinnamon


1 tsp. ground cloves

1 tsp. nutmeg

1/4 tsp. salt

1 cup honey

1/2 cup vegetable oil



Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Add instant coffee and baking soda to hot coffee; mix well and set aside. Beat egg whites until stiff. Add cream of tartar while still beating. Beat yolks and coffee mixture together with all the remaining ingredients. Fold in egg whites. Pour into an ungreased angel food pan. Bake 50 to 60 minutes, or until cake tester comes out clean.

Invert pan and allow cake to cool 30 minutes before removing from man.

This cookbook has other recipes that can be used for the New Year. For instance, take a look at: Rosh Hashanah Chicken on page 145, German Apple Cake on page 131, Holiday Compote on page 145 and Taiglach on page 144.

Sometimes you might find appropriate Rosh Hashanah recipes in regular, not necessarily Rosh Hashanah food sections.

It's rewarding to include a NEW recipe you've never tried. May it fill your lives with sweetness throughout the coming year!


