#### From the Desk of Rabbi Bruce Benson



Nes Gadol hayah Sham OR po!! Whaaat?

A great miracle happened here? Or was it there?

Growing up, most of us sang the song while we played dreidel that taught us the 4 letters emblazoned on the sides of a dreidel.

The translation? "A great miracle happened there" was used historically, until the 1940's when the current state of Israel was established and, amongst many changes in Jewish life, the letter SHIN (used in the word SHAM-"there" (a great miracle hap-

pened there) and that statement was replaced with the proud new verbiage, "a great miracle happened here. Since then, many people, Jews and otherwise, have been confused with clarifying the difference between Jews and Israelis.

Being a Jew is a religious connective to a historical timeline connecting people to a definitive faith pattern. A commitment to a spiritual religious pathway and set of defined

(and defining) rules many of which are shared with other faith communities and many not. But it is within the barriers of the walls of belief that we define who we are, how we choose to live and what our expectations are for ourselves and others.

The "HOLIDAY SEASON" conundrum appears every year around this time as we Jews are pulled to the threshold of frustration being told by the behaviors of our culture (tv advertising, radio and it's songs, movies, retail stores pushing the holidays, but, for the most part, ignoring Chanukah unless we push the culture in general to throw us a bone or 2 as long as it's not too "religious". Dreidels and menorahs are fine - but Jewish stars? Not so great.

As Jews, we go through our yearly dance of being part of a culture, not so fully accepted, in many ways - tolerated as annoyers attempting to de-Christmasize America by asking for representation in the land that supposedly is open to all, you know: the land of the free, and the home of the brave.







#### THE STAMP CORNER ~ ~ A CANADIAN HANUKKAH/HANOUKKA

The eight nights of Hanukkah begin this year with the lighting of the first candle on the hanukkiah at sundown on Erev Hanukkah, Sunday, December 14. Also called the Festival of Lights, Hanukkah commemorates the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem after the Jewish people reclaimed it

from the Seleucid Empire around 165 BCE. According to tradition, the Temple's menorah was to burn continuously, but there was only enough oil to last one day. Miraculously, it lasted the eight days it took to harvest, press, and transport a fresh supply of oil. Hence the holiday's eight days and nights, and the eight candles on the hanukkiah. The kindling of the lights, in commemoration of the miracle of faith, is central to the celebration of the holiday, and prayers, traditional songs, and religious readings are often a part of the lighting ceremony.

There are three countries that release stamps celebrating the holiday on a fairly regular basis: Israel, the United States, and Canada. In celebration of the country's cultural diversity, Canada produced its first Hanukkah stamp in 2017, and has issued a new design every year



since 2019. Featured in this month's column is Canada's multicolored 2024 issue, its seventh new design, which is among its most interesting; it features a photograph of a lovely, historic, and unique hanukkiah that is housed in the Aron Museum at Temple Emanu-El-Beth Sholom in Westmount, Quebec, an enclave within the city of Montreal. Founded in 1953, the Aron was Canada's first museum of Jewish ceremonial art objects.

Believed to have been rescued from a burning synagogue in Germany in 1938, when antisemitic violence in Nazi-occupied territories erupted in the horror of Kristallnacht, the silver-plated hanukkiah on the stamp is a symbol of faith and resilience. It features an ornate peacock on a curtained stage, its plumage illuminated with the lighting of each of its eight candles in a row at the base; the holder for the shamash, the "helper" candle used to light the others, is located at the top left. Although the peacock was a popular decorative motif when this piece was crafted in Poland in the 19th century, its appearance on a hanukkiah is unusual. Nevertheless, it reflects the Jewish value of performing



mitzvot -- acts of empathy and kindness -- in a beautiful way and helps shine a light on the miracle at the heart of Hanukkah.

On the stamp, the holiday is spelled in the two official languages of Canada, English and French (Hanoukka), as well as in Hebrew. It sold for 99 cents on its day of issue (November 14, 2024) and is classified as a "P (permanent) stamp" which means it can be used anytime within Canada for lightweight items such as cards and letters regardless of future postage rate increases.

#### Our Monthly TBEI Library Book Review.....by Sheilah Korinow




Talk about a book that's different! I'm reviewing \*JUDAIKITSCH (TCHOTCHKES, SCMATTESS, and NOSHEREI)\* by Jennifer Traig and Victoria Traig. It reaches people that, for the most part, I have been ignoring (except for those who love culinary treats). In an introductory paragraph, the authors wrote: "Ever since that un-

fortunate incident with the golden calf, Judaism has shied away from the plastic arts. Sure, we've got tasteful silver kiddush cups and some nice stained glass, but the religion lacks the fabulous kitschy statuary and icons so many other religions enjoy. We don't have Moses birdbaths in our yards, holographic Miriam keychains, or King David Nightlights by our beds." The authors hope to fill the void with crafts and cooking ideas. The authors go on and state: "We hope to be your funky, festive Jewish lifestyle guide. And we hope to open your eyes to the Jewish kitch all around you. Jewish culture \*does\* have its icons - they're just a little less obvious." Make sure you read the first chapter about the history of kitch - for a lot of information and a few laughs!

Just to give you a fair warning, not all of you will have some of the materials needed to create the recommended items. How many of you have low-fire clay

stocked in your cupboards? Not-to-fear - there are still lots of things vou can create.

Let's begin with cooking items. These are different from the recipes I shared with you on Rosh Hashanah and Pesach. The ones in this book involve "kitsch cooking" - it's where fun takes precedence over flavor. As the authors wrote: "a kitsch dish is always more enjoyable for your eyes than your tastebuds or, for that matter, your digestive tract. Kitsch cooking is not haute cuisine and it's not health food." After all, we are not "putting on airs." The authors make us laugh as they wrote: "Would you rather be an unadorned portabella mushroom or a frilly piece of gefilte fish "Jewshi"? The names of the food creations are hilarious. Let's take a look at some of them:



- -Brunch party for the hard of herring (a fish-free brunch)
- Rainbow of Shmears (cream cheese spreads)
- -Vegetable Jew-Shou (a Chinese dish with an Ashkenazi makeover)
- Boogie noodle kugel (spicy, a tribute to Bette Midler)
- Barry Manilow (a Russian raspberry pudding -sweet and smooth as the singer and songwriter)
  - Hava Tequila Pie (it's a "salty snack, a desert, and a drink all in one") Eat it with a fork!
  - Mount Sinai Sundae
  - Better than Neil Diamond cake (all I can say is Yum)!

Now let me test your creativity. The "Las Vegas Menorah Salad" is it's name. The major ingredients are asparagus spears and cherry tomatoes. The goal is to create a Chanukah menorah. Don't worry, a picture of it is shown in the book. It makes a cute presentation.

Other suggestions that are not related to food, but are quite interesting are:

- Neil Sedaka Box (You can make your own charity box, or pushke, right in your own home. This one uses a band-aid tin). You can add the suggested materials made up of rhinestones, beads and glitter, or anything else to decorate.
- If you are good with a needle and thread, then create your own "Steppin' Out" yarmulke, or even a pet yarmulke.

- Make your child or grandchild "The Borscht Belt" with simple materials from a craft store.
- "The Spice Girls Box" can be made from any box that may serve as a spice box for Havdalah.
- For the children at any Sukkot table, a miniature tabletop South Sea Sukkah would be a welcome sight.
  - For the Mah-Jong addicts, make your own Mah-Jong Menorah.
- For Purim, create a "Get Lit Wine Bottle" lamp. This is also useful for Shabbat. You could also "do your own thing" in decorating the bottle you choose.

JUDAIKITSCH is organized into introductory information related to how to use this book, and chapters on: Everyday Kitsch, Shabbat, Rosh Hashanah, Sukkot, Hanukkah, Purim Passover and Shavuot. It also has a list at the back for types of stores you may want to use for materials, plus a helpful list of websites you may visit which expand your knowledge for additional ideas, websites such as Jewish.com and paperjudaica.com. The authors ended their book with a description of what they were trying to do. They wrote:

"This book is not intended as a guide to Jewish practice or halachah (though it takes pains not to contradict it). It's just a guide to a more fun, stylish life. We encourage you to improve in ways that will better suit your spiritual and aesthetic expression." Have a little fun with this book. Enjoy what Judaism has to offer. Use your imagination and creativity!


